Butte, Mont., April 16.—Latest estimates of the loss occasioned by the bursting of the Hauser Lake dam, north of Helena, based upon reports received by The Miner from various points within the flood district, place the amount at about \$500,000, though this may be exceeded by about \$100,000 when a more detailed report is had from the more remote sections.

Many Perish in A Snow Slide

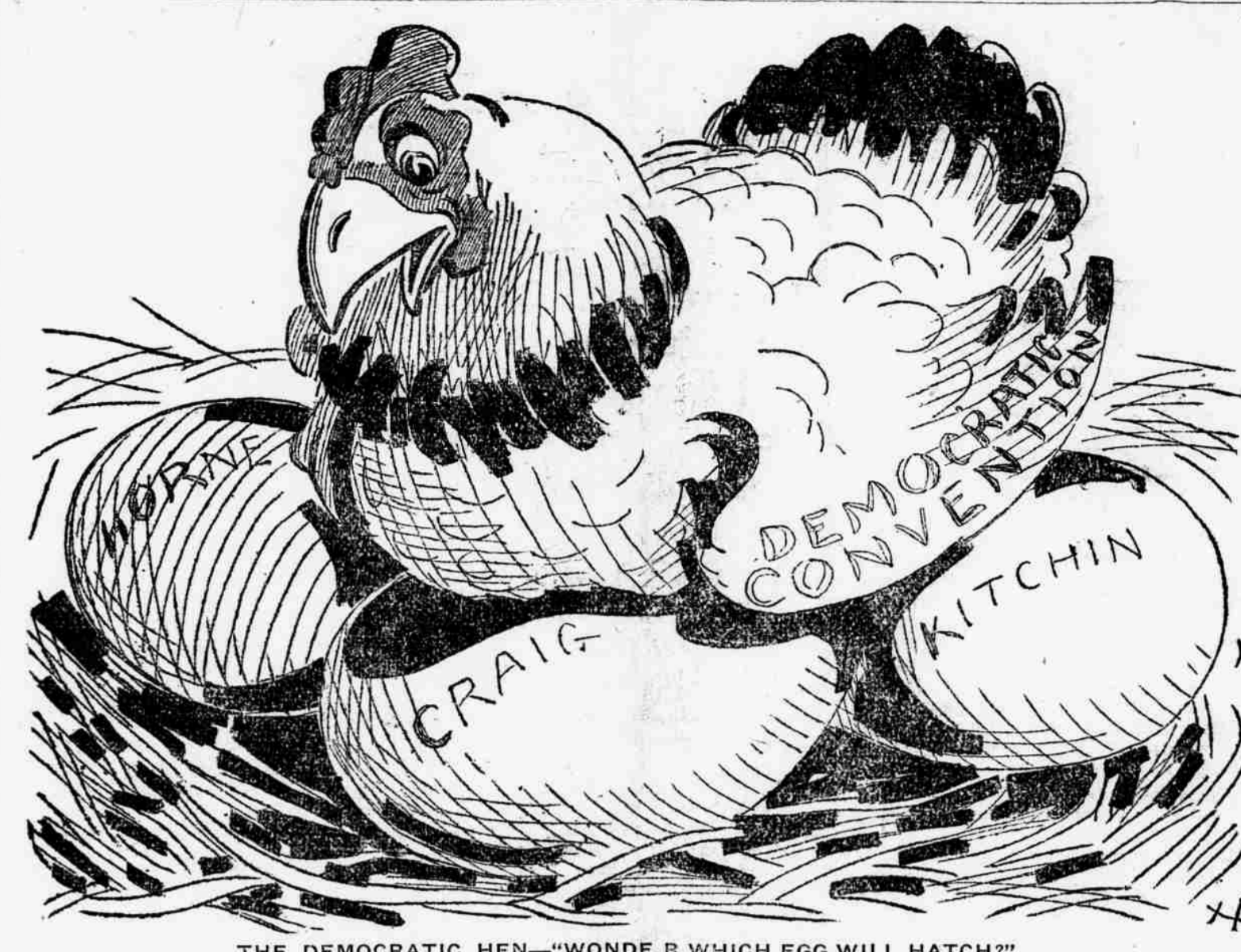
