

Auguste Ropke Pleads Guilty

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 29.-Auguste Ropke today entered a plea of guilty to five counts of the indictment charging him with embezzlement of the funds of the Fidelity Trust Company. The total of his defalcations was \$1,490,000.

. Louisville, Ky., Nov. 29.-Ropke was given an intermediate sentence with a minimum period of ten years and a maximum of eighteen years at hard labor. The exact length of time he will serve will depend upon good behaviou. Ropke was secretary of the banking department of the trust company. He was arrested last June and charged wiht the embezzlement of \$6,000 of the company's funds. Later an investigation showed that his defalcations had extended over a period of several years, and aggregated \$1,490,000 which was reduced by recoveries to \$1,140,-

Ropke and his famly lived luxuriously and according to popular belief, were possessed of a large fortune.
