New York Cotton

New York, Jan. 25.—The cotton market opened steady at an advance of 3 to 5 points and sold up to a net advance of 6 or 7 points right after the opening on steady cables, for favorable trade advices from Bremen and the failure of yesterday's meeting at Fall River to be followed by any announcement with reference to curtailment by domestic mills. Offerings increased on the advance to 15.08 for May and during the middle of the morning there was some irregularity but the market continued steady with a fairly active trade.

New York Stocks

New York, Jan. 25.—Gains were general at the opening of the market today. Six thousand shares of U. S. Steel sold at 78 1/4 to 78 3/8 as against last night's closing price of 78. Western Maryland, Southern Pacific and Union Pacific advanced 3-8 each and most of the other active issues improved fractionally. Several large blocks of the New York city bonds sold at 101 to 101 1/8, compared with yesterday's closing at 101 1/2. Toledo, St. Louis and Western pfd was the weak spot, declining 2 points.

New Orleans Cotton

New Orleans, Jan. 25.—Cotton futures opened steady at an advance of 2 to 4 points on favorable cables, continued absence of rains of any importance in Texas and a more cheerful dry goods market. Offerings in the early trading were free, coming principally from long who were selling, but were absorbed by heavy buying by a few brokers, one at least of whom was supposed to be buying for the account of one of the largest traders in the bull clique. The census report on supply and distribution, issued just before the opening of the market had no effect on prices in the early trading. At the end of the first half hour of business the more active months were 4 to 5 points over yesterday's close.
