THE SENATE — THIRTY-SECOND DAY — SATURDAY.

President Newland rapped the senate to order at 11 o'clock. Senator Davis, of Carteret, offering prayer.

Petitions Presented.

Davis, of Carteret: From citizens of Pollocksville, Jones, against near-beer.

Gardner, of Cleveland: From citizens of Cleveland county against near-beer.

London, of Chatham: From citizens of Scotland county against near-beer.

Resolutions and Bills Offered.

Washington, of Clay: Resolution to authorize the superintendent of the insane asylum at Morganton to receive George Bartlett, of McDowell county.

Fisher, of Polk: Prohibit the sale of wine in Polk county, except for sacramental purposes; also authorize the commissioners of Polk county to appropriate for a Confederate monument.

Coxe, of Jackson: Provide for standard measuring of cord wood and tan bark and provide for its inspection; also by request authorize the repayment of certain school funds.

Baggett, of Harnett: Define and prohibit monopolies or trusts in restraint of trade; also place treasurer of Harnett on salary; also punish persons for appearing in public places in a drinking or boisterous manner. The anti-trust bill places \$1,000 at the disposal of the governor for prosecutions.

Boyd, of Rowan: Amend the revival by transferring Alexander county from the 8th congressional district to the 9th and Union from the 7th to the 8th.

Pharr, of Mecklenburg: Relative to jurors' tax fees.

Hobgood, of Guilford: Relating to taxation of corporations by relieving corporations owning stock in other corporations.

Bills Ratified.

Authorize the commissioners of Chatham county to make contracts and receive compensation for special services.

Require sheriff of Anson county to purchase and keep bloodhounds.

Provide for docketing of ovelty charges in partition cases.

Allow Durham to issue bonds to improve streets.

Enable Sanford to issue bonds and levy a special tax.

Authorize Monroe to sell certain real estate.

Incorporate Lynn, Polk county.

Authorize Durham to issue bonds to pay its debts.

Allow Southport to subscribe for stock in the Wilmington, Brunswick and Southern Railway.

Relief of John Laws, register of deeds of Orange county.

HOUSE — THIRTY-FIRST DAY — SATURDAY.

The house was convened at 10 o'clock by Speaker Dowd. The prayer was by Rev. Mr. Wilcox, of the Central Methodist church.

Representative Pace sent forward a petition from employees of the Seaboard Air Line Railway asking for the prohibition of relief departments by railroad companies.

The committee on corporations reported favorably bills to amend the charter of Bladenboro and amend the charter of Sunset Park Railroad Company.

The committee on insurance reported favorably the bill to safeguard the revenues of insurance companies and protect citizens of North Carolina. Other committees reported a large number of local bills favorably to take their place on the calendar.

New Bills Introduced.

Devin: Amend the Revisal relative to witnesses in capital trials.

Battle: Establish a recorder's court for Wake county.

Weatherspoon: Allow Laurinburg to levy special tax to fund bonded indebtedness.

Wood: Amend the squirrel law of Transylvania county.

Kent: Amend the Revisal relative to congressional districts so as to transfer Union county from the Seventh to the Eighth congressional district and change Alexander from the Eighth to the Ninth district.

Ewart: Incorporate Hendersonville hospital.

Ross: Provide for the proper registration of all persons employed by the state.

Roberts: Amend the charter of Black Mountain.

Ramsey: Protect fish in Madison county.

Gills Passed Final Reading. Allow Hendersonville to issue school bonds.

Allow Blittmore to levy a special tax.

Allow Waynesville voters to confirm contract with Southern Assembly.

Permit special tax in Alamance county.

Amend Alamance bond law of 1903.

Provide special tax for Rutherford county.

Amend the charter of Elizabeth City.

Allow Concord to issue bonds.

Allow bonds and special tax for court house and jail in Pitt county.

Appropriate balance of \$1,000 for Appalachian Training School.

Pay \$34 expense of senate committee in visiting Western Hospital.

Bill to amend revisal relative to venue of actions was defeated by a vote of 19 to 30, after Representative Quikkel spoke at length against the bill.

Representative Ewart led a spirited fight against the bills to put all of Saluda in Polk county securing postponement of vote.
