THE SENATE—SATURDAY—39TH DAY.

President Pro Tem Pharr convened the senate at 11 o'clock, Rev. L. S. Massel, of the Christian Advocate, making the invocation.

Conference Committee Named. The senate received a message from the house transmitting a dozen or more bills and they were appropriately referred.

Representatives. Reavis, Dixon and Taylor, of Vance, were named on the part of the house and Senators Lenmon, Pinnix and Martin, of Buncombe, on the part of the senate as a conference committee on the bill to prohibit throwing sawdust in the streams of Yadkin county.

New Bills Introduced. Pharr, of Mecklenburg: Incorporate the Industrial Reform and Manual Training School for Colored Youth, also amend Sec. 4735 of the Revisal relative to insurance, allowing mutual fire insurance companies to be formed by parties engaged in the same kind of business with 25 risks.

Johnson, of Duplin: Create road commission in Rose Hill township, Duplin county, and levy a special tax.

Wagoner, of Alexander: For relief of R. G. Taylor and Cynthia Cox, of Alleghany county.

Martin, of Buncombe: (by request) Correct certain grants for land in Cherokee county.

Coxe, of Jackson: Authorize commissioners of Jackson to levy a special tax to meet the general indebtedness; also amend the road law of Jackson county relative to bridges; also authorize the commissioners of Jackson to work convicts on certain farms; also improve certain roads in Jackson county.

Martin, of Washington: Amend public laws of 1909 relative to fisheries; also prevent hogs running at large in a school district in Dare county.

Landon, of Chatham: Amend the charter of Pittsboro; also amend the act establishing a special school tax district No. 4 in Wake and Chatham counties.

Davis, of Carteret: Amend the revisal relative to county canvassers in Carteret.

Lenmon, of Union: Incorporate Mt. Springs Baptist church, Union county; also permit dentists and veterinary surgeons to write prescriptions for whiskey; also extend the eastern boundary of Marshall 1/8 of a mile.

Sikes, of Wake: Increase the state taxes for public schools from 18 cents to 25 cents on the \$100 worth of property; also relative to dead bodies for medical schools.

Bellamy, of Brunswick: (by request) Resolution relative to the Atlantic & Yadkin Railway.

Petitions against the sale of near-beer were presented by Senators Irvie, of Rockingham, and London, of Chatham.

Bills Ratified. Tax dogs in Gaston county and make them subjects of larceny. Amend the charter of the Winston-Salem & Southbound Railway Company.

Relative to incest. Incorporate the Anson Sanitarium. Authorize the commissioners of Sampson county to donate for a Confederate monument at Clinton.

Relative to disorderly conduct on the public roads of New Hanover county. Relative to disorderly conduct on the public roads of New Hanover county.

Relative to sinking fund for trustees of Hillsboro township, Orange county. Permit road improvement in Marble district, Cherokee county.

Relative to officers of Wilmington receiving pay as witnesses in superior court.

Validate deeds of Phoenix Lodge of Masons of Fayetteville.

Authorize the town of Wilson to issue bonds.

Relative to sidewalk paving in Sanford.

Authorize Clay county to issue bonds to improve roads. Make disorderly conduct a misdemeanor at Delgado.

Create recorder's court at Aurora, Richmond county. Change boundary line of two school districts in Greene county.

Authorize Tyrrell county to fund its debt. Authorize Rutherford county to levy a special tax for bridge purposes.

Incorporate the Roanoke Seminary. Amend the road law of Laurel Hill township, Scotland county.

Incorporate Unionville, Union county. Protect owners of land in the enjoyment of their rights in Guilford and other counties.

Divide the board of commissioners of Gaston into two classes. Joint resolution ratifying the 16th amendment to the federal constitution.

Special Order for Building Bill. The Boyden-Horne bill appointing a state building commission and authorizing a \$1,000,000 bond issue to build a state administration building in Raleigh, was reported favorably by the joint committee on appropriations and made a special order for next Wednesday at 12 o'clock.

Passed Second Reading. Provide for bond issue by Louisburg.

Authorize bond issue by Mt. Airy, Surry county, to improve roads. Authorize the commissioners of Tarboro to issue bonds.

Authorize the highway commission of Valleytown township, Cherokee county, to issue bonds. Enable Hertford graded school district to issue bonds.

Authorize the commissioners of Rutherford county to levy a special tax to pay indebtedness. Submit to voters of Waynesville the question of ratifying certain contracts. Relative to the charter of Elizabeth City.

Amend the charter of the Randolph & Cumberland. (Amended by the committee.)

Passed and Sent to the House. Establish school district in Lee county.

Amend the charter of Lumber Bridge Robeson county. Create Ararat school district, Surry county.

Validate the acts of commissioners of Yancey county. Authorize the commissioners of Mecklenburg and the board of education of that county to pay for county map.

Correct state grant in Yancey county. Amend Sec. 2598 of the Revisal relating to logging roads.

Regulate sales of lands under mortgages and deeds of trust. (Substitute by the committee.)

Raise the age limit for working on the roads from 18 to 21 years in certain counties. (For concurrence in senate amendment.)

Passed and Ordered Enrolled. Incorporate Culbertson, Cherokee county.

Authorize Shelby to buy and operate an electric light plant. For relief of William A. Bailey, representative-elect from Davie county.

Allow Reidsville to grant license for use of streets by public service corporations.

Authorize Tryon to sell lot formerly used for school purposes. Authorize election in Topsail township, Pender county, to determine whether certain funds shall be used for schools.

Relative to statistics of tobacco. Regulate the summoning of tails jurors.

Abolish the office of standard keeper of Vance county. Prohibit the commissioners of Tyrrell county from issuing bonds without submitting the issue to the qualified voters.

Routine Items. The senate passed a joint resolution protesting against abolishing the United States mint at Charlotte and it was ordered enrolled. A copy of the resolution is to be placed in the hands of North Carolina's representatives and senators in congress.

Unfavorable reports were made on the bills to protect and safeguard human life against deadly weapons; relating to owners of automobiles in New Hanover county paying a license tax; prevent trespass on steam railroad tracks; and relative to the duties of sheriffs.

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for the Boyden and Sikes state highway commission bills and 1,000 copies were ordered printed. Action was deferred on the bills concerning undertakings by defendants in claim and delivery proceedings; increase the salary of the adjutant general from \$1,000 to \$2,000; establish farm-life schools in the state; provide for registration of plats and subdivisions, and authorize married women to contract as if unmarried. Also on the resolution of appreciation of the late Judge David Schenck and Maj. Jos. M. Morehead.

The bill providing for entry of satisfaction of judgment on cross indexes was withdrawn from the enrolling clerk's office and sent to the committee on judiciary. The bill placing the recorder of Wilmington on the recall was re-referred to the committee on judiciary. The senate at 1 o'clock adjourned until 12 o'clock Monday.

THE HOUSE—SATURDAY—39TH DAY. The house convened at 10 o'clock, Speaker Dowd in the chair. Prayer by Rev. A. J. Moncrief, of the Baptist Tabernacle.

Petitions were presented by Mr. Koonce from three hundred citizens of Onslow county against the proposed general fish commission law; an by Thompson, of Beaufort county, against the fish law.

A number of bills were reported unfavorably from committees including Allow counties to issue road bonds; require union labels on public printing; prohibit the purchase and sale of revolvers except to officers. A great number of bills received favorable report and took their places on the house calendar.

At the request of Speaker Dowd the house suspended rules and put through immediate passage a joint resolution he introduced in regard to the assay office in Charlotte. He wanted immediate passage for the moral effect it would have in deterring the federal authorities at Washington from discontinuing the Charlotte office, which he declared to be a great and necessary convenience. The resolution was sent at once to the senate for immediate concurrence.

Bethel: Amend the charter of North Spencer.

Battle: Amend the act of 1907 relative to relief of Confederate soldiers.

Marshall: Allow all Confederate soldiers \$5 per month pensions.

McPhaul: Relating to collection of taxes in Robeson.

Carr, of Duplin: Establish uniform hours of labor.

consented for the bill to go over to Monday for final passage although insistence was expressed by a number that there should be no further delay.

The Doughton Bond Issue Bill. The Doughton bill authorizing an issue of \$550,000 to take care of state bonds falling due in 1913 and for the \$350,000 deficit in the state treasury came up and was passed on second reading by roll call, the vote being 32 for and one against the bill. The opposition was Crumpler, of Sampson. The bill took its place on the calendar for final reading Monday, only one roll call a day being allowed on such a bill under the constitution. Mr. Doughton explained that the bill provides for the present deficit by empowering the state treasurer to issue short term bond notes for the \$349,000 deficit. There was a considerable discussion as to the constitutionality of such a provision but the best authorities pronounced it easily within the right of the legislature.

Joint resolution allowing Mrs. J. L. Stewart, widow of Representative Stewart, deceased, of Montgomery county, his pay and per diem of \$240. Better enforce the Clay county game law.

Amend Durham county salary law and create a county auditor.

Amend charter of Presbyterian Orphan's Home.

Fix salaries and provide auditor for Robeson county.

Incorporate Hendersonville Hospital Association.

Provide proper registration of all employees of the departments and institutions of the state. (On being

read there was objection to this and it went back on the calendar.) Provide for settling disputed county lines of Wilkes and Alleghany.

Representative Marshall, of Surry, introduced out of order, a bill to elect all county boards of education by the people.

House adjourned at 1:45 to 11 o'clock Monday.
