

Yesterday In The Legislature

THE SENATE — FRIDAY — FIFTY-SECOND DAY.

The senate convened at 10:30 o'clock President Newland in the chair and Rev. Livingston Johnson offering prayer.

Announcement was made by Senator Graham of the death of the only daughter of Senator Hawkins of Warren county. An indefinite leave of absence was granted him and appropriate resolutions adopted.

New Bills Introduced. Bassett: Make uniform bills of lading in North Carolina. Regulate nomination of candidates for the state senate in certain sub-national districts.

Brown: Create board of audit and finance for Columbus county and fix its duties.

Armstrong: Relative to fees for chief game warden.

Platts: Prohibit the use of dynamite for killing fish in streams in North Carolina.

Long: Relating to pay of witnesses in probate courts.

Kitchin: Amend the law relative to roads in Halifax county.

Lemmond: Protect townships and counties issuing bonds to aid in building the Salisbury road.

Cobb: Empower the trustees of Indian Normal school of Roves on county to transfer property.

Bassett: Provide that electric power companies may use highways in developing water and other power.

There came unfavorable report from committee for the bill to require the Atlantic Coast Line to run an additional train between Rocky Mount and Fayetteville. And for the bill to enlarge Hoke county from portions of Robeson county.

The Hologram bill for state primary law for all parties was made a special order for next Tuesday at 11:50 o'clock, coming from committee with report without prejudice.

Substitute for the Brown Club Locker bill.

The committee substitute for the Brown bill to prohibit liquor in club lockers came on the calendar with favorable report.

Passed and Sent to the House. Relative to State graded schools. Authorize Jamesville to issue bonds. Allow Statesville to refund debt.

Improve the roads of Wayne county. Amend the charter of Kernersville. Establish and maintain public libraries.

Authorize the commissioners of Lee county to issue bonds for improving the roads of Jonesboro township.

Authorize Dunn to issue bonds for a sewerage system.

Authorize East Bend township, Yadkin county to issue road bonds. Enlarge the boundary of Winding Hill school district, Guilford county.

Authorize Dunn to issue bonds for a municipal building.

Incorporate the North State Central Railroad Company.

Passed and Ordered Enrolled. Provide for good roads in Lenoir county, Franklin county.

Amend charter of Enfield. Authorize the commissioners of Transylvania county to levy a special tax.

Incorporate Marietta, Robeson county.

Second Reading Bills. Fifty-fourth roll-call bills passed second reading and took their place on the calendar. Most of them were local bills, though among those of public interest were: Incorporate the Greensboro, Roxboro & Norfolk Railroad; amend the general drainage law of 1909; incorporate the Raleigh, Winston & Western Railroad; authorize the commissioners of Buncombe county to issue bonds to aid the Western Carolina Teachers' Training school; establish the North Carolina school for the feeble minded; authorize counties to vote a special tax to supplement the school fund; protect the forests of the state from fires; change boundary between Durham and Wake counties, giving Durham a strip of Wake's territory.

State Farm in Good Condition. The report of the joint committees on penal institutions visiting the state penitentiary farm in Halifax county showed the farm to be in excellent condition, the convicts well cared for and the farm well managed.

New Bills Offered out of Order. McDonald: Regulate holding primary elections in Lee county.

Kitchin: Establish the constitutional districts of the state. (On calendar until after action of caucus of democratic members of the general assembly).

Pharr: Protect the state capital from fire.

McLaughlin: Authorize Hoke county to issue bonds.

Starbuck: Authorize the commissioners of Forsythe county to issue bonds for good roads.

Ivie (by request): Amend the charter of Reidsville.

Hobgood: Create two additional judicial districts. (He asked that this bill be placed on the calendar, but Senator Bassett objected and after a discussion the bill was referred to the committee on judiciary.)

Graham: Establish standard time in North Carolina.

Cobb: Drain the lowlands of Saddle creek, Robeson county.

Baggett: Allow Lillington to issue bonds; also relative to the stock law of Harnett county.

The senate received from the house a resolution for a joint session Saturday at 12 o'clock to vote for trustees of the state university.

Bills Ratified. Provide for working the roads of Wilkes county.

Incorporate the towns of Dundarrach, Robeson county.

Amend the charter of the Black Mountain Railroad Company.

Repeat the law establishing a highway commission in Vance county.

Amend the charter of the town of Windsor.

Authorize the commissioners of Cherokee county to issue bonds to pay floating indebtedness.

Provide for improving the roads of Catawba county.

Incorporate the Beavertown school district, Cherokee county.

Establish a graded school district in Lee county.

Authorize the commissioners of Buncombe county to issue refunding bonds.

Amend the charter of Littleton. Prohibit the sale of near beer, berine and other like drinks.

Authorize High Point to issue negotiable bonds to pay debts.

Amend the charter of Morehead City.

Provide for maintenance of graded schools of Hendersonville.

Allow the commissioners of Madison county to build bridges.

Authorize the commissioners of Beaufort county to levy a special tax.

Establish a special court in Shelby for Cleveland county.

Relative to deprecations by domestic fowls.

Incorporate the town of Belvia, Brunswick county.

Consolidate the charter of Elizabeth City.

Resolution authorizing the superintendent of the state hospital at Morganton to receive into the hospital George Bartlett, of McDowell county.

Billard, of Cherokee: Joint resolution for a joint session of house and senate tomorrow noon for the election of trustees of the University of North Carolina. Woodson: Prohibit the introduction of further local and private bills after February 24th, for this session. McArthur: Regulate the transportation of deceased bodies. Rodwell: Amend the Warren county road law. Dowd: Amend the charter of Charlotte to issue bonds for sewerage, schools, streets, auditorium and for other purposes; amend the laws of 1901 and 1903 and provide for the support of Charlotte Carnegie library. Devin: Consolidate the department of agriculture and the A. & M. College. Dillard, of Cherokee: Extend the corporate limits of Murphy. Connor: Establish the Toisenot road district. Carr, of Durham: Amend the charter of Durham. Spahnour: Allow Burke to pay \$1,500 for the Confederate monument. Spahnour: For the relief of the sheriff of Burke county. Quickel: Apportion the members of the house of representatives. Gives Guilford, Wake and Mecklenburg 3 members each and Buncombe, Durham, Forsyth, Gaston, Halifax, Iredell, Johnston, Nash, Pitt, Robeson, Rockingham, Rowan, Union and Wayne, two each and all the others one each. The bill was put through immediate passage and sent to the senate. Taylor, of Vance: Fix pay of Vance county commissioners. Wallace: Allow Carteret county to issue bonds for home for aged and infirm. Rose: Amend the law as to terms of county court in Cumberland. Allow citizens of certain territory in Robeson county to vote on being annexed to Cumberland county. McGill: Amend the law relating to clerical help in the registration of automobiles. Roberts: To divide the state into ten congressional districts. This is the committee bill that takes Catawba county from the Ninth and puts it in the Eighth, and Wilkes from the Eighth to the Seventh, Hoke being placed in the Seventh and Avery in the Ninth. The bill placed on the calendar to await action of the democratic caucus tonight. Clement: Amend the Halifax road law. Kirkman: Appoint justices of the peace in Guilford county; amend the charter of High Point. Dixon: Enlarge the powers of the Pollockville board of aldermen. Taylor: Allow Brunswick county to establish a fence. Amend the charter of Brunswick and Wilmington Railroad Co. Billard, of Guilford: Create the county of Seales out of portions of Guilford, Forsyth, Rockingham and Stokes counties. Long: Allow Graham to issue bonds. Amend the Alamance game law. Majette: Insure to employes the payment of wages. Cox, of Randolph: Allow Randolph to issue road bonds. Allow Asheboro to issue bonds. Thompson: Allow Rockingham to issue street improvement bonds. Wooten: Amend the law relating to Kingston graded school. Provide for the indeterminate sentence of persons convicted of crime. Amend the charter of Kinston. Speaker Dowd announced a calendar committee consisting of Representatives Connor, Allred and Weather- spoon. The Machinery Bill introduced. Mr. Doughton for the committee on finance reported the machinery act, companion bill for the revenue bill that the house has already passed and sent to the senate. One thousand copies of the bill were ordered to be printed. Bills Passed Final Reading. Amend the charter of Wilmington. Improve roads in Waynesboro township Anson county. Improve roads of Mt.
