Camak, Ga., Feb. 25.—W. W. Thompson, conductor of Georgia railroad train No. 3, which left Augusta at 11:15 Thursday night was shot and seriously injured by an unidentified negro near here. Thompson discovered two negroes on the blind baggage of his train. Together with J. M. Cook, special agent of the road, he went to put them off. When they approached one of the negroes pulled a revolver and threatened to shoot. Thompson advanced and the negro shot him through the body and then leaped off the moving train and escaped in the darkness. The other negro was arrested by Cook. Thompson was taken to a hospital in Augusta. He is one of the oldest conductors in service on the Georgia railroad.

EFFECTIVE WAR ON THE BILL BOARD NUISANCE

Cincinnati, O., Feb. 25.—Cincinnati's municipal art league scored a fresh victory in its fight against posters when the implied threat of a boycott induced the management of a corps of foreign ballet dancers to abandon a purpose of burying the city under a coat of paper and printer's ink.

Because of the efforts of the league most symphony concerts, music festivals and similar functions here have been advertised largely without the use of bill boards. Theatre managers generally, however, have paid little attention to the league, declaring the dollar of the art lover is as welcome as that of any other person but no more so.

RULES GOVERNING FEDERAL JURY SERVICE.

Washington, Feb. 25.—Replying to a request for information as to whether members of the organized militia are exempt from United States jury duty, the war department has ruled that the selection of Federal jurors is governed by the laws of the state in which the particular Federal courts sit and it is within the discretion of the Federal courts to excuse jurors for the same reason that would result in their excuse from serving in a state court. Congressional legislation would be necessary to secure a broader exemption from jury service of members of the militia.
