BADLY SHOT FCR BURGLAR

Gastonia, March 21.—A serious shooting affair took place at the home of Spake Elmore on East Franklin ave nue, about 9:30 o'clock last night when Mr. George A. Jenkins, a prominent liveryman, was the target for a load of shot fired by Elmore, who claims that he mistook Jenkins for a burglar. The load of shot took effect in the lower right side and Mr. Jenkins lies in a local hospital in a very serious condition.

According to the claims of Mr. Jenkins and a companion, John Thomas, the two had driven to Mr. Eimore's home to get some chickens, for which they had bargained with Spake Elmore's father yesterday afternoon. They had been to the house early in the evening about seven o'clock, but Mr. Elmore was not at home, and reat the house to get the chickens. Jenkins had gone up the steps and was on the porch when Elmore opened fire. Jenkins was able to stumble down the steps and Mr. Thomas lifted him into the carriage and drove rapidly to the hospital, which is a good distance from the scene of the shooting.

Elmore claims that he saw some one walking around the house, and in the dark could not make out who it was Mistaking Mr. Jenkins for a possble burglar, he fired, with the almost fatal affect noted above.

It is said that all parties to the affair had been drinking, hence the exact facts in regard to the matter are diffi cult to obtain. The shooting is the subject of much talk and many rumors here this morning. Mr. Jenkns is doing as well as could be expected under the circumstances, but the physicians state that it is impossible to say wheth-
