

Dixie Flyer Plunges From Trestle Into The River—Many Lives Lost

Disastrous Train Wreck Near Ocilla, Ga. On A. C. L.

Fast Report Had it 40 Lives Were Lost—At 11 O'clock 10 Dead Bodies Had Been Recovered From Water And Debris.

Physicians Rushed to Scene—Rescuers Endeavoring to Locate Bodies of Missing Passengers And Trainmen.

Ocilla, Ga., March 25th—The Dixie flyer, on the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad went through a trestle over the Alabama river near here at 11 o'clock this morning killing 40 passengers. Five coaches were derailed.

The wreck occurred at Altamaha bridge, Alabama river, a few miles from Ocilla, and the latest information from the scene of the wreck is that 40 persons were killed and many injured.

Seven persons were killed and more than a dozen injured when train No. 95, known as the Dixie flyer, was wrecked near Ocilla, Ga., on the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad.

According to the reports of some of the passengers who came to Ocilla the train was derailed without any warning and the engine was wrecked by the breaking of an axle about ten feet under water.

Reports from the wreck were to the effect that the entire train went into the river and that forty were killed and many were injured.

Rescue trains have been sent to the scene from Waycross, Tifton and Willacoochee and it is stated that it will be 36 hours before the tracks are cleared.

Doctors Rushed to Scene. Savannah, Ga., March 25.—Atlantic Coast Line and other doctors left here for the scene of the Dixie flyer wreck near Ocilla. Five persons are reported to be dead and Conductor Parnell of Savannah is charge of the train, missing. The wreck has gone to the scene from here.

Official Account. Savannah, Ga., March 25.—The Atlantic Coast Line general superintendent's office gives out the following account of the wreck of the Dixie flyer.

Train No. 95, known as the Dixie flyer, was wrecked on the Brunswick division of the Atlantic Coast Line Railway at 7:20 o'clock this morning. The train carried down the river and was telescoped and the first Pullman sleeping car fell into the river.

under the wreckage. A number of passengers were injured. Cause of Accident. The accident was caused by the engine driving wheel axle breaking off, although the engine remained on the trestle.
