

Seventy Bodies Removed From Pancoast Mine

Tragedy of the Colliery is Far Worse Than Was First Thought—Many Other Bodies Thought to Be in the Mine.

Revised List of English Speaking Victims of The Fire and Full Story of Fearful Tragedy—Rescuers at Work.

Up. The eagerness with which these were grabbed by the undertakers and their employees called forth indignation from the onlookers, some yelling, "body snatchers" at them, as their ambulances were hurried away.

It is related that Connelman Per... Mine Foreman Knight and Fire Boss Dawes, perished as a result of their going into the depth of the mine to warn others of their danger. They were overcome before they could return to safety.

There is another opinion among mine workers as to whether the men who lost their lives could have been saved. Some think that if all men in the underworkings had been immediately notified that there was a fire in the mine it could have gotten out before the workings became filled with smoke and gas.

The disaster was the worst in the history of the hard coal fields in this section, exceeding the number of dead in the terrible twin shaft disaster near here some years ago, when 51 men and boys lost their lives by entombment.

By Associated Press. Scranton, Pa., April 8.—The dead at Pancoast will reach 85, it is estimated this afternoon, a number of missing workmen not yet being accounted for. These are believed to have been in that part of the mine where the fire raged. Seventy bodies have been taken out.

Squabble Over Laborers. Honolulu, April 8.—A writ of habeas corpus for the 150 Filipino laborers aboard the steamship Senator and destined for the Alaskan canneries was issued in the federal court here yesterday. United States Marshal Eugene R. Henry will attempt to serve it tomorrow. It is another move in efforts made by local planters to prevent removal of laborers whom they have brought here at great expense.

The Senator still is cruising back and forth off Pearl Harbor. The entire coast is being guarded by the police, and Japanese power sampans are kept under espionage. No one is allowed to leave shore for the Senator.

One Hundred and Seventy Convicts Reported Lost In Coal Mine

Fearful Disaster Reported From Birmingham, Ala. Birmingham, Ala., April 8.—It is feared that 170 convicts have been killed by a mysterious explosion which took place in the Banner Coal mines near here at 6:40 o'clock this morning.

W. M. Smith Named By Governor To Take Testimony

Publishers Are Not Responsible. Allegations Against Ed. C. Caton, Having Been Denied, Will be Aired Before The Specially Appointed Gentleman.

By Associated Press. New York, April 8.—Officials of newspaper corporations cannot be held personally responsible for the newspapers' publication of libelous matter. Such was the decision of the appellate division of the supreme court in the case brought by John D. Rockefeller, Jr., against S. S. Carvalho, Bradford Merrill, treasurer and Edward H. Clark, secretary of the Star Co., publisher of the New York American. The court orders all proceedings against them dismissed.
