Washington, April 12.-Two of the ariff measures which the democratic house expects to pass in advance of **

tariff measures which the democratic house expects to pass in advance of any general legislation were introduced today by Chairman Underwood of the committee on ways and means.

They are Canadian reciprocity, following the identical lines of the McCall bill passed last session, except for a clause authorizing the President to continue negotiations for reciprocity with Canadian articles not covered by the pending agreement, and a bill to put on the free list about 100 articles now dutiable under the general tariff. Both acts will receive early consideration. The free list bill is designated to placate farmers for agricultural losses which they will sustain under the Canadian agreement, but it contains also some foodstuffs and boots and shoes. The list is as follows:
