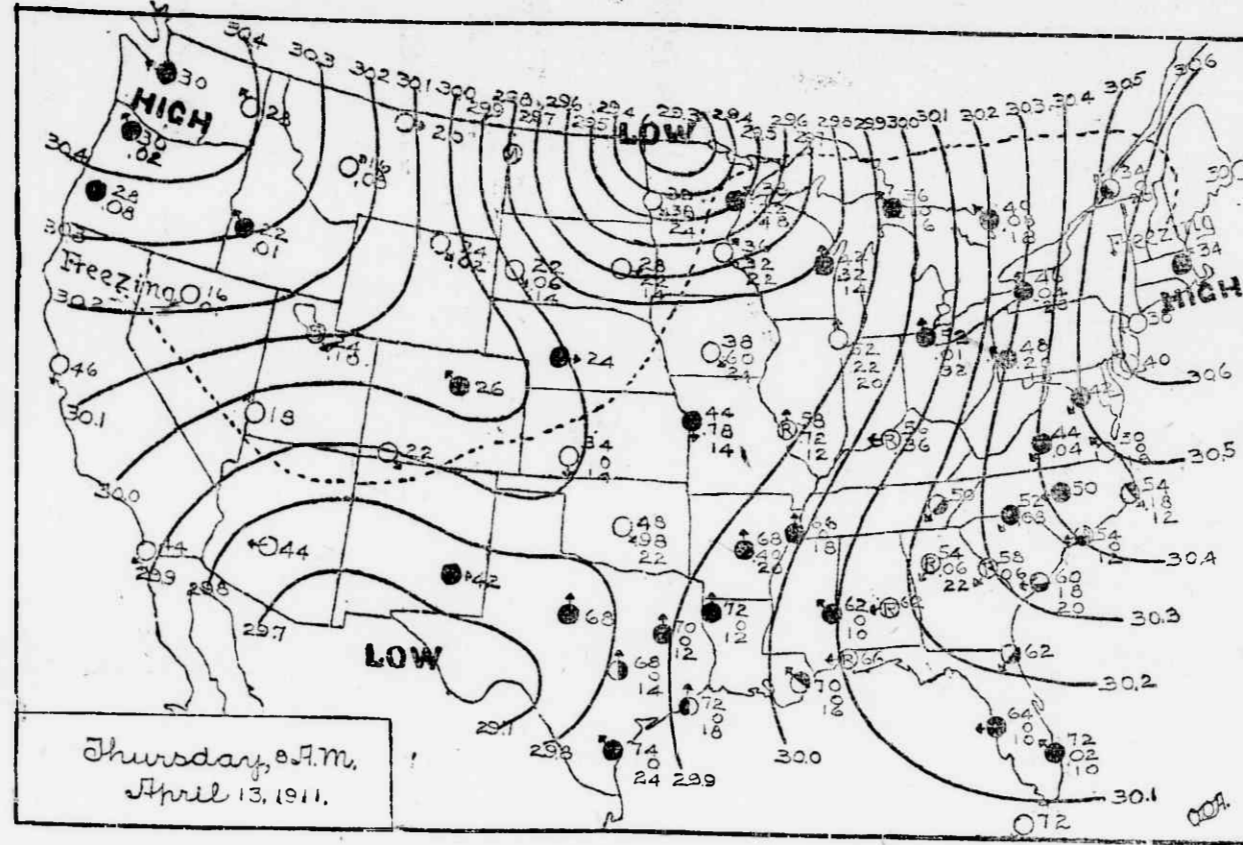

Observations taken at 8 a. m. 75th meridian time. Isobars or continuous lines, pass through points of equal air pressure. Isotherms, or dotted lines, pass through points of equal temperature; they will be drawn only for zero, freezing, 90 degrees and 100 degrees. Symbols indicate state of weather: ☉ clear; ☁ partly cloudy; ☂ cloudy ☉ rain; ☄ snow; ☁ report missing. Arrows fly with the wind. First figure, minimum temperature for past 12 hours; second, 24-hour rainfall, if it equals .01 inch; third, wind velocity of 10 miles per hour or more.

### THE WEATHER

Forecast for Charlotte and Vicinity. Unsettled with showers tonight or Friday; warmer tonight.

State Forecast. Unsettled, showers tonight or Friday; warmer tonight in interior, cooler Friday in extreme west portion. Moderate easterly winds.

Weather Conditions. The low pressure area noted yesterday moving over Kansas has moved northward and developed in intensity, its center being marked on the map this morning by the word "low" over northern Minnesota. It has caused high winds about the upper Lakes and a large area of precipitation extending from the Dakotas and Minnesota, southeastward to the Carolinas. Copious rains have fallen from Arkansas northward along the Mississippi river.

Temperatures are generally higher in the eastern half of the country, but there is a cool wave advancing from the northwest, due to a rapid increase in pressure in that section. Freezing temperature is reported from eastern Maine, and covers the northwestern quadrant of the country.

Conditions favor, for Charlotte and vicinity, unsettled with showers tonight or Friday; warmer tonight.

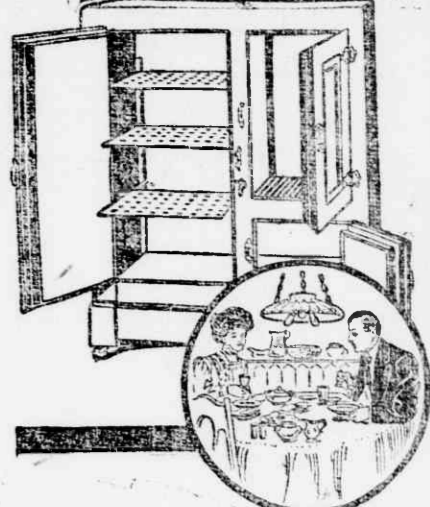

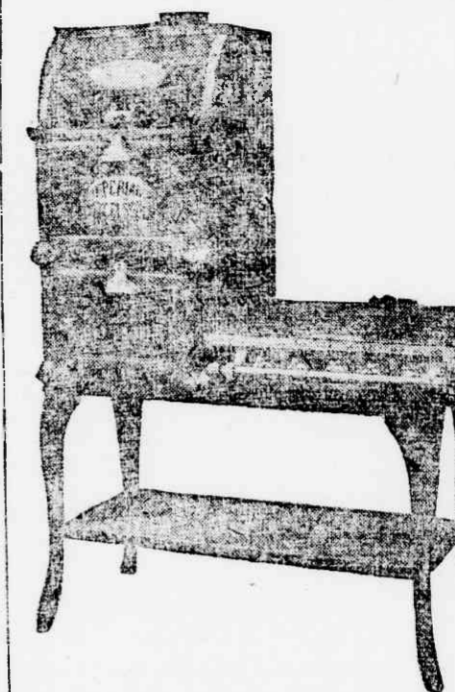
