

Heat Wave Pushes Thermometer Past Other May Records

Grows Hotter Than it Was Yesterday Throughout South—Birmingham the Hottest and Charlotte the Coolest at Early Hours To-day.

High Temperatures Reported at 10 O'clock And They Were Going Up With Sun—Louisiana the Only State Promised Any Relief To-day.

By Associated Press. Atlanta, Ga., May 27.—Heat conditions equaling, and in some cases surpassing those of yesterday when the May temperature records in many places were broken, prevailed over the southeast of the Mississippi river and south of Tennessee today.

Very Hot in Memphis. Memphis, Tenn., May 27.—At 7 o'clock with a temperature of 80 degrees, Memphis according to the local weather bureau was in a class of its own, showing the highest of temperatures at that time in the morning.

Knexville Roasting. Knoxville, Tenn., May 27.—High temperatures continue here today, the record being 89 degrees at noon with prospects of further rise in the mercury.

Chattanooga Sweltering. Chattanooga, Tenn., May 27.—This weather is experiencing the hottest of the season. The thermometer registered 95 at noon with indications of reaching 92 yesterday's highest mark by 3 o'clock.

CHICAGO HAS DEATHS FROM AWFUL HEAT

By Associated Press. Chicago, May 27.—With one death and two other heat prostrations reported by 10 a. m. in Chicago, the third of the record breaking days of a long and unusual heat spell was ushered in today.

Thirteen deaths have resulted from the weather, which has almost been unbroken for nearly two weeks. Yesterday and the day before all records were broken, the thermometer registering 84.2 on each day.

SOME ALCOHOL IN NEAR-BEER.

Mack Stokes, of Orangeburg, Held on Charge of Violating Dispensary Law. Orangeburg, May 27.—Mack Stokes, whose place of business located on Broughton street was raided some weeks ago, when 19 barrels of near-beer was seized, was again before Judge C. P. Brunson, of the magistrate's court in a preliminary hearing in the case against him for selling alcoholic concoctions in violation of the law.

Storm Causes Heavy Loss. Possibly \$200,000 Loss Results From Wind in Durham—Tobacco Factory Is Wrecked. Durham, May 27.—Possibly \$200,000 damage was caused here by a severe storm that wrecked the venerable tobacco factory, containing 50,000 pounds of tobacco, blew down every telephone wire, set fire to and destroyed the Clatham Hosley Company's knitting mills, burned out half the telephone system, wrecked street cars. Several persons were burned by crossed wires. All theatres were closed as the city was left in total darkness.

Atlanta, Ga., May 27.—Representatives of forty-seven commercial organizations in the state will meet with the chamber of commerce of this city today to discuss ways and means of sending an exhibit of Georgia agricultural resources to the United States land and irrigation exposition to be held in Chicago next December.

Middle Meet West Point. West Point, May 27.—With officials in the army and navy interested spectators, the Annapolis "Middle" and West Point cadets were ready for their annual baseball game today. The army has won six out of nine games played since 1901.

SAND DISPUTE THE CAUSE OF A CAR STRIKE. By Associated Press. Heavy Loss From Fire. Dubuque, Iowa, May 27.—A large tract of the Standard Lumber Company was a mass of coals today as a result of what is believed to have been an incendiary fire last night. It was the third fire at the lumber yards in eighteen months, the total losses aggregating about \$800,000.

Thirty Days In Jail and \$250 Fine

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Nearly a Third of New York's Playground Completely Wrecked by Flames Which Started at 2 O'clock This Morning—Loss \$3,000,000.

By Associated Press. New York City, May 27.—Coney Island, the play ground of New York, suffered the worst fire disaster of its history today. Dreamland, the largest of the amusement parks, was wiped out and four blocks adjoining, covered with booths, restaurants, hotels, moving picture theatres and resorts of varied types, were destroyed. The fire broke out at 2 o'clock in the morning and was not under control until three hours and a half later. The loss will amount to between \$2,000,000 and \$3,000,000. In all about 200 buildings were burned and perhaps two thousand persons—cessionnaires and employees—were turned into the streets homeless and penniless. No lives were lost.

At a sweet service at the home this morning, Rev. Dr. Caldwell gave, in tender words, "all of joy for mourning" and comfort to the sorrow-laden. A quartet consisting of Misses Oates and Glenn and Misses Baxtreaser and Scott sang, "Safe In the Arms of Jesus." Beautiful flowers covered the little white casket and scores of friends went with the parents to Elmwood. The ball-bearers were Messrs R. S. Eben Nye and Frank Hutchison, brothers of Mr. J. J. Hutchison, and Mr. J. B. Beall.

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
