

Executive Board Met Last Night

Rejected Proposition for Ornamental Lighting System—Citizens Oppose Bitulithic Between Southern Station and Cedar Street.

Mr. George A. Miller appeared before the city executive board last night with a proposition to install a system of ornamental lights along the main thoroughfares of the city.

His proposal was that the property owners along the line of the proposed system pay for the posts which are to be established on each sidewalk 80 feet apart and which are to have several lights on each post.

After Mr. Miller had stated his proposition to the board, Mr. A. V. Harrell, manager of the Charlotte Power Co., made a statement expressing the willingness of the Charlotte Power Co. to accept the contract for furnishing the power for the system absolutely at cost.

Mr. J. W. Conway, southern manager of the General Fire Extinguisher Co., explained to the board the advantages that had accrued to Atlanta from the installation of such system as Mr. Miller proposed and advocated the adoption of the system for Charlotte.

Mr. H. C. Arnold, superintendent of the Greenville Electric Co., who was present, also spoke in high terms of the system, and stated that Greenville would adopt the system in the near future.

The board, after hearing Mr. Miller and the other gentlemen, announced that they would consider the proposition and give him an answer at an early date.

Mr. W. F. Harding appeared before the board in behalf of several property owners on West Trade street, who are objecting to the paving of West Trade, between the Southern depot and Cedar street, in bitulithic.

Mr. F. C. Abbott had offered to donate to the city a lot 200x50 feet as soon as the connecting street was opened and that the longer the matter was delayed the greater the cost would be, since the neighborhood would soon be so thickly settled that a large amount of property would have to be condemned, if it were decided later to open a street there.

City Engineer Firth said he had made an estimate of the cost of opening the street and found that it could be done for about \$1,700.

City Engineer's Salary Raised. Upon motion made by Mr. Murphy, the salary of Mr. Firth, city engineer, and superintendent of streets, was raised from \$2,000 a year to \$2,400.

The resignation of two members of the fire department were accepted by the board. They were Messrs. E. G. Graham and Leo Fleming.

Mr. J. F. McBee, of Baltimore, who is here with his oil preparation for oiling the streets, has the contract for oiling South Tryon, North Church from Seventh to Tenth avenue, and Poplar and Pine. He will start on South Tryon on Wednesday. Church street comes next and after that Poplar and Pine.
