

They simply ask the people to use ess water, take one bath per week perhaps, instead of one bath per day, which is little enough during such hot weather as we are now having and will have until a spell of wet wea ther sets in. They decide off-hand, au parently, that "pumping water from Briar creek is not feasible," because it can not be filtered.
