

Honorable Massacre Of Manchus In China Is Reported

Dispatches From Shanghai Tell How Revolutionists Effected Wholesale Slaughter of Their Enemies—An Appeal Issued by Rebels.

Would Wipe Out Rulers of Present—Communication With Hankow Interrupted—Imperial Government Making Great Plans.

By Associated Press. Shanghai, Oct. 19.—Six packed steamers arrived here from Hankow today carrying refugees.

Most of the foreigners were Russians employed in the tea factories and Belgian iron workers employed in the steel works.

Massacre of the Manchus. Accounts of the revolutionary attack on Wu Chang as given by the refugees today emphasize particularly the massacre of the Manchus in this city.

Run On Bank. The run on the Imperial Bank here still continues, but the officials appear to have ample resources.

Red Cross Formed. The Red Cross organization has been started here at Hankow and Wu Chang, Chinese women are serving as Red Cross volunteers for the first time in history.

Employers' Liability Commission to Report. Washington, Oct. 19.—Under instructions to present its final report to congress by the first of January next, the employers' liability and workmen's compensation commission, appointed last March to devise a plan for insuring compensation to injured employees, is preparing to enter upon the final stages of its work and will meet in this city next Monday to formulate a tentative recommendation.

Proclamation of Leader. "I come to save the Chinese people. I have no idea of acquiring personal profit or preference but aim only to pull you out of the fire and cure your cankering maladies.

Be Merciful. "Yet, let us be merciful to our enemies. Our soldiers must be careful not to recklessly kill the Manchus. Let us give them an opportunity to surrender their uniforms and weapons. If they do not then yield and continue enemies of the revolutionary movement, they must be killed."

Communication Cut. Peking, Oct. 19.—The official communication with Hankow had been interrupted since sunset last night caused consternation throughout the capital today.

Wild Rumors Abroad. The wildest rumors of reverses to the imperial arms spread like wild fire, although no definite facts to support them were available.

Government Officials Optimistic. Government officials continue to profess the utmost optimism. They declare that the severance of telegraphic communication for a period of only 12 or 18 hours over a line 650 miles long is no ground for apprehension.

An Imperial Edict. An imperial edict today places all naval and military forces in the region of the Yang Tse Kiang under the control of Yuan Shi Kai, who is directed to inflict rigorous punishment upon the rebel ring leaders and to appeal to "the misguided and coerced rebels" to renew their allegiance to the state.

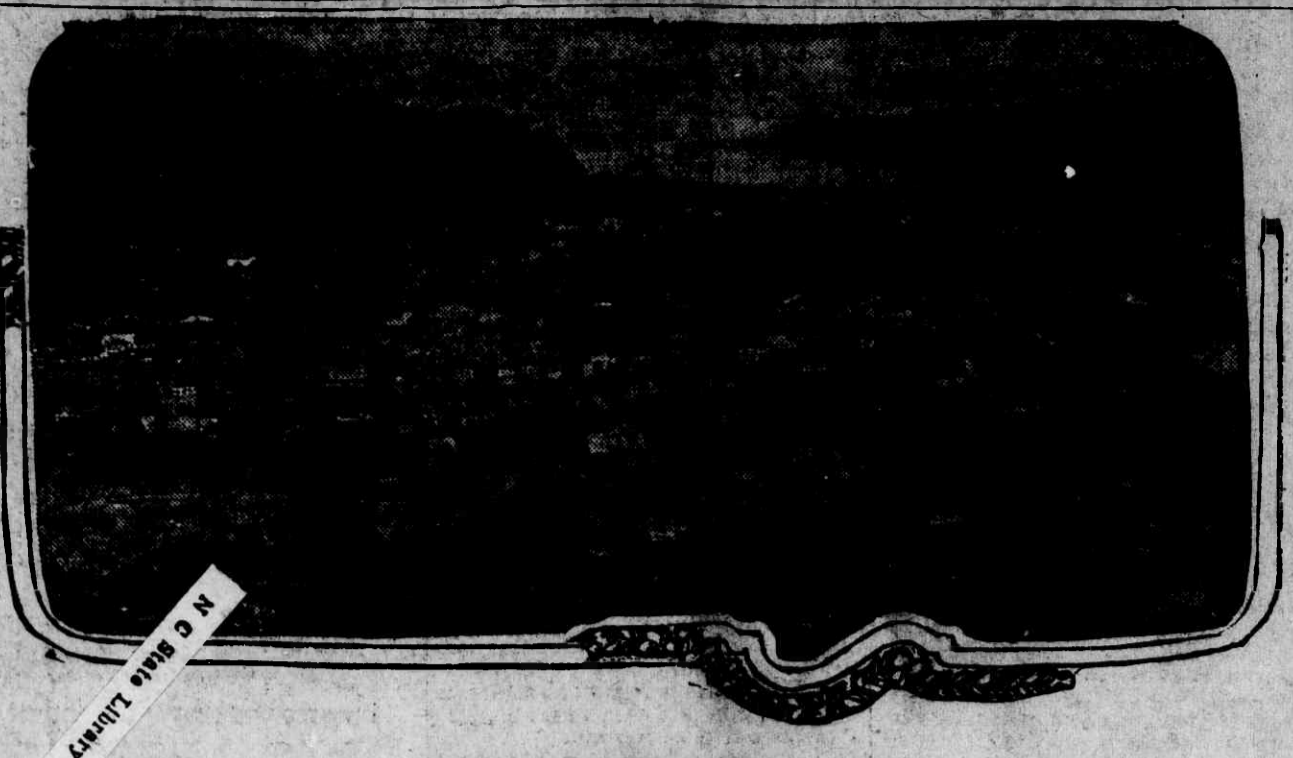
