TELEPHONE MERGER-STOCK-HOLDER MEET

For some time the Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph company and the Cumberland Telephone and Telegraph company have been negotiating for the merger of the Cumberland into the eBell.

After several conferences held in Atlanta between the officials of both companies, the merger has been finally agreed upon.

This is one of the largest business transactions consummated in the south for years.

The Southern Bell is a company of \$30,000,000, operating from West Virginia to Alabama.

The Cumberland is a company of \$20,000,000 and covers the territory from Illinois to Louisiana.

This will make the Southern Bell a company of \$50,000,000, with the issuing of \$20,000,000 more in bonds in the near future almost certain.

The company can then give direct telephonic communication to all points in the south and west as far as the Mississippi river.

Stockholders to Meet.

On February 23rd the stockholders of the Cumberland will meet to make final arrangements and to elect certain officers. Among them will be Mr. W. G. Gentry, president of the Southern eBell. Upon this election Mr. Gentry will be the head of one of the largest telephone companies in the world.

It was largely through Mr. Gentry's administration as president that the Southern Bell has made such wonderful advancements in the past few years.

Mr. Gentry's son, Mr. Tom Gentry, is a resident of Charlotte, holding the place of chief clerk to Mr. Morgan B. Spier, division superintendent.

JURY AWARDS NO DAMAGES IN ALEXANDER CASE

The jury appointed by Clerk of the Court C. C. Moore to hear the condemnation proceedings brought by the city board of water commissioners against Mr. W. S. Alexander and The Industrial Development Company to secure the right of way for the pipe line to the Catawba river, rendered their decision yesterday afternoon, awarding Mr. Alexander and the development company no damages.

The jury consisted of Messrs. E. L. Keesler, J. A. Durham, George P. Wadsworth and H. G. Ashcraft. The property of Mr. Alexander and the Industrial Development Company adjoin each other, the conditions being exactly the same in both cases, and therefore the same jury sat in both cases. The opinion of the jury was that no damage was done to the properties by running the pipe line through them and they rendered their verdict accordingly.

Mr. R. C. Dellinger, against whom the water board also brought condemnation action, was awarded \$125 damages by the jury which heard that case a few days ago. The jury in that case held that the property was damaged slightly and that the plaintiff should have \$125 therefor.

Todd Case Next

The only case now remaining is the Todd case and the clerk of the court has appointed the following gentlemen a jury of appraisal to estimate the damage, if any, done Mr. Todd's property by the presence of the pipe line. Mrs. Baxter J. Hunter, of DeWitt; Henry M. Armstrong, of Route 7, Charlotte; Rev. D. A. Austin, Charlotte; W. F. Baker, Route 2, Charlotte; Charles M. Carson, Charlotte. This jury will examine the property and hear the arguments of the attorneys in about ten days.

The water board was at first confronted with several suits of the above type in its work of extending the water system to the river. However, they did not all have to be taken before the clerk of the court for arbitration, but were adjudicated before the proceedings were instituted. Comparatively few of the property owners between the city and the river objected to the pipe line passing through their property and some of them welcomed it coming, one large landholder having said that rather than ask damages for the presence of the pipe line he would estimate his property benefitted \$5,000 by being on the pipe line.

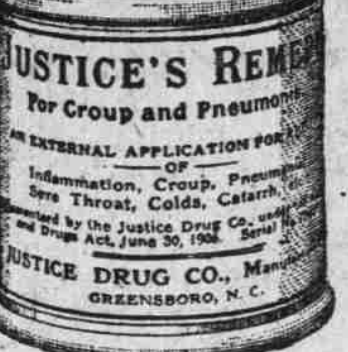

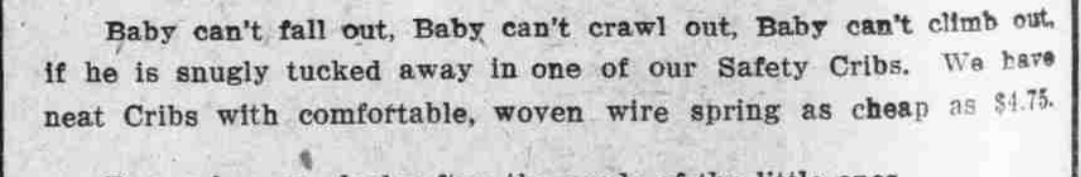
