After going minutely into the complaint brought against Chief of Police Christenbury by Mr. J. P. Beatty, the city executive board last night by a vote of 11 to 1 dismissed the complaint. In connection with the complaint, which involved the disposition of unidentified property, a committee consisting of Messrs. Garibaldi, Murphy and Davis, was appointed by Mayor Bland to draft a set of rules governing the disposition of unidentified property at the police station.

The hearing lasted from half-past eight to half-past ten. Twelve or fourteen witnesses were examin-Mr. Beatty was represented by Mr. Jake Newell. Recorder D. B. Smith appeared for Chief Christenbury, not as a paid attorney, as he explained, but merely as a friend of the chief's.

The complainant stated that he had been informed on the 16th of January by Clyde Earnhardt, son of Policeman Earnhardt, who was employed at Mr. Beatty's store, that Jack Christenbury, son of the chief, was riding Mr. Beatty's wheel, which had been stolen on January 2nd. He stated that as soon as he missed the wheel he 'phoned a description of it to the police station, where some one took down the

When he learned that the wheel was at the Christenbury home he took Clyde Earnhardt with him and went to the chief's home, where he saw aJek and stated to him that he had heard Jack had a wheel which corty) had lost. He got the wheel, but, according to Jack Christenbury, used some pretty rough language in the hearing of Mrs. Christenbury, little daughter and other members of the family.
