DEVELOPMENTS THAT BEAR ON HAWKINS CASE

Special to The News. Asheville, N. C., Feb. 10.—Apropos of the sudden death this week in Hendersonville of Balleis Guice and the recommendation of a coroner's jury that the stomach of the body be given a chemical analysis, it is recalled that the dead man was the divorced husband of Bessie Clarke Guice, the woman who was so badly wanted as a witness last fall in the coroner's inquest over the body of Myrtle Hawkins. As to Mrs. Guice, it has been learned within the past few days that while the inquest over the Hawkins girl was going on she wrote to a relative of her's in Hendersonville saying that she was going to leave Augusta from which place she wrote the letter and stated that the relative need not write her there any more. No new address was given.

What may be given along in this case somewhat on the statement made by Judge Ewart in his article a short time ago when he said there was a woman in the case and she would have to be found before the real criminal could be run to earth and she is the only one who knows all about it. It is just possible that with all the new interest being aroused and the case that some new and startling developments may be brought to light at an early date.
