### Fine Prevention Asso. To Meet

(From Salisbury Post.)  
The North Carolina Fire Prevention Association is called to meet in Salisbury Wednesday, February 21st. This is an organization composed of the special agents and field men representing the different insurance companies writing fire insurance in North Carolina, and has for its purpose the prevention of fires. Associations of like character and purposes are operating in nearly every state of the union.

The North Carolina Association inspects one town in the state each month, inquiring into the construction and care of each building, other than the dwellings. They also inspect the water works and fire department with the view of indicating how each can be improved, and outlining the benefits that will accrue to the public in the way of reduced cost of insurance, if those suggestions are carried into effect. The organization claims to have nothing to do with the making or maintaining of rates, at the same time offers the assurance that if the fire rate can be reduced the fire rate must of necessity be decreased. They claim to treat with the public in an advisory spirit only, pointing out defects in buildings that can be remedied at insignificant cost, such as bringing flues up to a reasonable standard, removing trash, oily waste, wooden spitoons from the premises, putting tin under the stove, the absence of which can be readily understood at fire breakers. They will present for the consideration of the city authorities ordinances that have been drawn with much care and are not in conflict with the State Laws.

We understand many of the cities inspected have adopted these ordinances as a whole, principal of which is one outline fire limits, then again a standard to which buildings must be built within those limits, limiting the gasoline, and other high explosives, prohibiting the throwing of trash in the street and alleys, and several others that are calculated to improve the town. This organization is putting forth every effort looking to educating the public along the lines of building to a better standard, keeping their premises clean, and other things that are calculated to reduce the fire waste of North Carolina. They claim they can accomplish little without the hearty co-operation of the public—in this way the campaign is one of publicity and education.

The question appeals to us, as we believe it should to every citizen of Salisbury and Rowan county, as well as the state of North Carolina, looking to upbuilding our state and producing conditions whereby the fire insurance tax, which has come to be quite a burden, can be reduced.
