PALMETTO SOLONS. (Columbia Record.) The general assembly of South Carolina convenes in annual session tomorrow. We have no advice to give the body, except to go slow in the matter of new legislation. When in doubt don't touch it. A good rule for guidance. We are cursed with too much law and too little law enforcement. Every time a new law is added to the statute books, and allowed to lapse into "innocuous desuetude" it brings all law and authority one step further into public contempt. The time, patience and money the public should be spared the taxation of futile legislation. Reform of the primary elections and compulsory education are two important and desirable measures that should be enacted if possible. Ignorance and corruption are twin brothers and corruption may be found hand in hand at the ballot box. It ought not be necessary to use compulsion to secure the education of any portion of the white stock of South Carolina. It should cause the blush of shame to mantle the cheek of any proud Carolinian that the suggestion should be necessary. And yet, it is a fact, only too well corroborated and established, we believe, that thousands of our adult native stock use cross marks when called on to sign their names. It has been stated on authority that there are more negro children than white children enrolled in the public schools of the state, and any one of ordinary observation may note with what zeal the colored people are taking advantage of the educational facilities afforded them. This is very much to the credit of the "inferior" race, but how long or how legitimately may this term be used with regard to them if they should become more literate than the superior race? What white Carolinian can afford to look down with contempt on a race whose children are in school while his are wasting their opportunities in idleness or are sent to exhaust their immature strength on drudgeries or burdens for which their elders should be responsible? It is a grave question, going to the root of our civilization and social equilibrium, which it is up to the superior race to face and answer with the truth. No less device will answer. Evasion and equivocation will inevitably undo us, in the solution of this problem. "Why is he so bitter at the girl he was only recently engaged to?" LET THE SUNSHINE IN.

(Raleigh Times.) The Henderson Gold Leaf says: "Already thoughtful farmers are beginning to whisper among themselves that in all probability tobacco will not bring anything like as good prices next season as it has this one." This statement is in substance the same as was heard the first of 1913, that the crop year would be bad, that prices would be low, that a money panic would sweep the country and affect business and that the democratic administration would mean disaster to business and farming. The cry of these pessimists was audible from every quarter. To increase this pessimism a disastrous storm swept the state in September just before harvest time and destroyed a large part of the year's production. Notwithstanding this, the year has been one of the best in the history of agriculture. Prices have been far above the average and the farmers have approximately made as much as would have been made under favorable conditions. There are always a lot of howlers and foretellers of calamities which never happen. The country does not know a winter will be the outcome next year. The conditions are certainly as favorable as they were the first of last year and there is no reason why any one should predict any unforeseen decline in tobacco prices or any other product of the soil. But the number of consumers of the product of the farm increases every year, the sun continues to shine and the man who first sees to it that his household supplies are made on the farm has no reason to fear anything. He will get good prices for anything else.
