ON THE ALERT FOR A STEADY JOB

(Springfield Republican.)

There are great industries, including agriculture, lumbering and construction work in which great numbers of the men must be laid off every winter, and these go to swell the army of the unemployed. If any industries can be found or developed which will give work when these occupations fail, it will help greatly toward a solution of the problem. It may be noted that the Italian shrewdness and foresight in dealing with this condition of affairs which no literacy test could guarantee "A steady job" is their ideal, and they have a kind of freemasonry by which they bear of one, no matter where it is. If a worker bears of a contract on the other coast which will keep his shovel busy for a year or more, he is off at once, thinking little of the cost of travel in comparison with steady work, and it is not easy for his employer to keep him from finishing up the job on hand. Much thought, much scheming, much anxious inquiry are given by these humble workmen, and the keenness of their induction is as wonderful as their scent for the weather. When they begin to buy steamship tickets, either way the sign is one that students of economic conditions do not ignore. To a certain extent they solve the problem unaided by the government, yet at a serious cost for travel and loss of time. How much can

be done to mitigate these recurrent displacements in a question which nobody can yet answer and there is the reason for a board investigation of the problem such as the commission proposes.

Involuntary Bankruptcy.

Raleigh, March 3.—An involuntary proceeding in bankruptcy has been instituted here against Frank W. Thornton, extensive dry goods merchant in Fayetteville. The assets are estimated at \$25,000 and the liabilities \$40,000. Thornton assigned his stock a few days ago to S. W. Cooper, banker of Fayetteville, John W. Winsdale as attorney, filed the petition in the federal court here for the petitioning creditors. A return day will be named at once.

SUES RAILWAY FOR DELAY IN REACHING BAPTIST CONVENTION

Raleigh, March 3.—Rev. C. H. Norris of Holly Springs has just instituted a unique suit against the Norfolk Southern Railway Company here in which he demands \$2,000 damages for delay in reaching the State Baptist Convention at Shelby last fall. He secured permission to flag a through train and the train would not stop although the engineer recognized and acknowledged the signal. The delay caused him to miss important sessions of the state convention.

RELATIONS OF GOOD ROADS TO RURAL SCHOOLS

Washington, March 3.—The rural population is more willing to support better schools today than at any previous time. It is being realized that all educational activities or agencies must be more or less correlated, and more than all else, that they must be made accessible to the children. In many counties where bad roads prevail, most of the schools are of the antiquated one-room variety. They are usually located along bad roads which, during the winter, when the schools are usually in session, become so nearly impassable as to make it difficult for the children to reach them. This condition causes irregular attendance and restricts the educational opportunities of the child. Not only this, but it often impedes the economic consolidation of these smaller schools into larger, stronger graded schools, with high school courses, directed by a competent principal and corps of teachers, according to the office of public roads, U. S. department of agriculture.

On the other hand, in counties which have improved their roads, the schools are easily reached, the average attendance greater, the efficiency largely increased and economic consolidation made possible. Regular attendance at school means consistent and regular growth of both school and pupil, and consolidation of schools means a maximum of efficiency at a minimum of cost. It is also noteworthy that there is a marked tendency for the consolidated school to become the social and intellectual center of the community. Most modern rural school houses are constructed as to serve the community as gathering places for various kinds of public meetings, and where vans are used to convey the children to school during the day they are frequently pressed into service to haul the farmers and their wives to institute work, lectures, or entertainments at the school house. The consolidated school becomes a sort of community center to which all educational and social activities converge, and in order that it may properly perform that function all of the highways leading to it should be so improved as to render it readily accessible throughout the year.

WAKE OFFICERS LAND FOUR WAKE FOREST BROTHERS IN JAIL

Raleigh, March 3.—The Pinkleton brothers, four of them, from Wake Forest, were committed to Wake jail today to await trial later in the week in the superior court for the several charges made against them that developed the fight and fusillade between them and officers of the law at Wake Forest. Officers tried to take T. C. Pinkleton for trespass at the Royal Cotton Mills and the resistance developed during which the Pinkletons were barricaded for several hours in the Pinkleton home and fired eight or more shots at the officers, led by Deputy Sheriff W. R. Timberlake and Chief of Police S. B. Mangum. Timberlake sustained four shot wounds, neither one at all serious. Several women of the family helped the Pinkletons in their resistance.

Boston, March 3.—Responsibility for the wreck of the tank steamer Oklahoma, which broke in two off the coast of New Jersey on January 4, with the loss of 26 lives, is placed wholly on the failure to put in force a legal provision that would control and standardize the construction of steam vessels. The report of the federal inspectors was filed here today.

WORTH KNOWING.

The Smithsonian Institution at Washington, D. C., is the gift of the people of the United States of James Smithsonian of England, who, in dying in 1829, left under certain conditions a bequest of \$541,379 for the establishment of an institution "for the increase and diffusion of knowledge among men." The original amount has since been increased by

other bequests and means to about \$900,000. The government is vested by act of congress in a board of regents, composed of the vice president and chief justice of the United States three senators appointed by the vice president, three representatives appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives, and six citizens chosen by congress. The presiding officer, ex-officio, is the president of the United States.


