





Interest in the president's sixth message was apparent when it became known he would address congress tomorrow in advocacy of tht repeal of the clause exempting American coastwise shipping from the payment of canal tolls. Mr. Wilson for the first time asks congress, particularly his own party, to reverse itself, but his argument is that when congress last passed on the question present international circumstances did not then exist. The presdent believes a general distrust of the intentions of the United States has arisen and because of doubt existing on the interpretation of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty he urges the repeal of the provision.
