Notice of Election

Under and by virtue of an Act entitled "An Act to amend Section 206 of Chapter 242 Private Laws of North Carolina, Session 1907," ratified by the General Assembly of North Carolina the 11th day of October 1913, an election will be held in the City of Charlotte on the 10th day of March 1914, under the same rules and regulations that govern the election of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of said City as now prescribed by law. A new registration has been ordered by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Charlotte in accordance with the provisions of said Act. The registration books before said election will be kept open for a period of thirty days (including Sundays) preceding the 10th day of March, 1914, after which date no person shall be allowed to register for said election. The purpose of the election is the submission to the qualified voters of the City of Charlotte the said Act entitled, "An Act to Amend Section 206, Chapter 242, Private Laws of North Carolina, Session 1907," so that there may be levied an annual tax for the support and maintenance of the schools of the public schools in the City of Charlotte which special tax shall be not exceeding 30c (instead of 20c) on the hundred dollars valuation of property and 90c (instead of 60c) on the poll. Those voting in favor of this Act shall vote a written or printed ticket, "For increasing school tax," and those voting against it shall vote a ticket printed "Against increasing school tax." The polls on the day of election will be open from sunrise in the morning until sunset on the same day and no longer. The polling places for said election will be those used in the elections held in the City of Charlotte which are as follows: Ward No. 1.—City Hall. Ward No. 2.—Court House of Mecklenburg County. Ward No. 3.—No. 2 Fire Department House. Ward No. 4.—E. W. Berryhill's Store. Ward No. 5.—B. L. Kishiah's Blacksmith shop on North D St. Ward No. 6.—Thomas and Fowler's Store, Belmont. Ward No. 7.—H. G. Howie's Store, 1195 East 4th Street. Ward No. 8.—Woodruff's Pharmacy, Dilworth. Ward No. 9.—King's Barber Shop, South Tryon Street. Ward No. 10.—H. F. Severs' Store, Seversville. Ward No. 11.—W. J. Fite's Store, North Graham Street. The registration places will be as follows: Ward No. 1.—J. E. Morris' store, 5th and College Streets. Ward No. 2.—County Court House of Mecklenburg County. Ward No. 3.—Globe Electric Co.'s office, West 4th St. Ward No. 4.—E. W. Berryhill's Store. Ward No. 5.—B. L. Kishiah's Blacksmith Shop, No. D Street. Ward No. 6.—Chas. T. Hicks' Barber shop.
