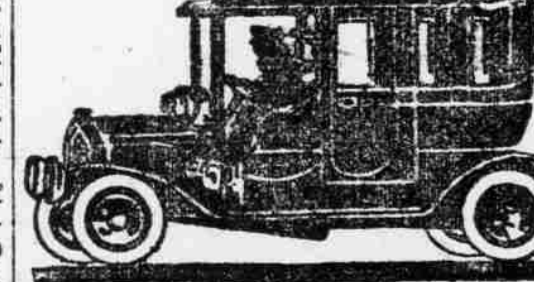

DIRECT MARKETING.

(Asheville Gazette-News.) While various plans are under discussion for bringing the country producer and the ultimate consumer together, the Baltimore Sun is prompted by the experience of some of its advertisers to call attention to a valuable and neglected means to this end. It was expected that the parcel post would be utilized largely in establishing a direct market for farm products, but it has failed to meet expectations in this particular. This is not the fault of the parcel post, the Sun is convinced, but it is due to the lack of initiative on the part of both producer and consumer. A few small advertisements carried in that paper soliciting fresh table supplies brought over 100 responses.

Something more systematic, however, will probably be needed fully to develop the possibilities for direct marketing. The newly created division of markets in the department of agriculture has announced a purpose to assist in this work. Express companies, spurred by parcel post competition, also are doing valuable missionary work along this line and incidentally creating business. The reduction in rates has been followed in places by active solicitation of rural business. In New York for instance, agents have been put in the field to bring producer and consumer together, and it is declared have developed a considerable business in poultry, farm and dairy products. Whether similar possibilities for the bulkier products of the market garden is more doubtful since transportation charges would be considerable in proportion to their value; although to be sure in many cases they would not equal the present average difference between what the producer receives at wholesale and what the producer pays his dealer. This is particularly true as regards the large centers of population.

PUBLIC CLAMOR.

(Wilmington Dispatch.) The world is informed by The Atlanta Georgian that the pendulum of public opinion, as to the guilt of Leo Frank, is swinging the other way. Does this mean that the public has commenced to believe that Frank is not guilty, or to entertain serious doubt about the matter? It could hardly mean anything else. Being so, we suppose that chances for Frank in getting a new trial grow brighter. This does not mean that the supreme court of Georgia would be swayed by public opinion, but that there must be some strong evidence—new evidence—in Frank's favor; otherwise, public opinion in Atlanta, public opinion that played about as strong part in the trial as in any we have yet heard of, must have found decidedly strong evidence to make it change its mood. The Frank case has not only been one of the most sensational, but one of the most clamorous that has ever been tried in this country, and the latter did not subvert the ends of justice. Frank may be guilty, but the presumption of the law, before the trial, was otherwise, and yet public opinion in this case presented an unsightly spectacle. Public opinion cannot be chloroformed in any case, nor can it be suppressed, but public opinion in matters of trial, where only evidence is supposed to play a part, can at least behave itself, should act in decent sort of way. Jurors in murder cases are kept together during the trial and are not allowed to converse with outsiders about anything, or even among themselves about the case. Yet such demonstrations as made in the Frank case virtually made a farce of this idea. We would like to see a new trial of this particular case; a speedy new trial, where the evidence could be considered after the storm and free from the shouts of the multitude, so to speak. The evidence would show for itself whether Frank is guilty or not, and justice would have no reason to weep at the outcome.

The Brooklyn Eagle, a decidedly unexcitable paper, thinks that often in the south there is too much excitement about trials; that public clamor plays too much of a part. It admits that such is so very often in trials in New York city, like in the Becker case, and deprecates it. Undoubtedly this is true, and under circumstances of this kind it is looks like a change of venue should always be directed by a court, or jurors obtained from some other place, if the laws permit it. The latter applies in Virginia and is a logical, really humane law. Undoubtedly there should be a speedy trial when murder has been committed, but the trial should be free from clamor. The case should be tried exclusively on the evidence; not upon emotions. When so tried it will add speed to the final termination of the case, as there will be less for lawyers to lug in, effort to obtain a new trial. If such did not shorten the life of such cases, then the laws or the judges would be wrong and one or the other, or perhaps, both, should be changed. Speedy termination of cases, under calm conditions, is what is wanted and should be obtained.

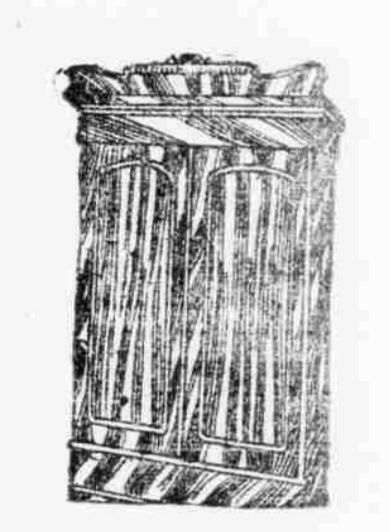
