## INJUNCTION AGAINST FEDERALS

Macon, Ga., March 20.—The injunction taken out by Manager George Stallings in the Bibb county superior court would prevent Federal League representatives from approaching or negotiating with any Boston National League player but would not affect the Federals' action toward any other club in Georgia. The injunction is intended to afford protection only to the Boston club.

The Macon South Atlantic League club and other Georgia cities in organized baseball do not figure in the injunction.

**Will Not Employ Injunction.**  
Savannah, Ga., March 20.—President George F. Armstrong, of the Savannah South Atlantic League club said today that the club will not employ injunction under the Georgia contract labor law to prevent the Federal League from negotiating for players already signed with this club.

President N. P. Corish, of the South Atlantic League, has gone over the proposition and, if occasion arises which would necessitate such action the different cities in the league are in position to employ the injunction to protect themselves against the Federal League.

### INTERESTING LECTURE ON CANAL AND PANAMA EXPOSITION IN 1915

"I can not go to the exposition, because for bringing the exposition to me," wrote a distinguished Alabamian to Byron L. Lick, of San Francisco, who gave a highly entertaining and instructive illustrated lecture at Queens College last night on the Panama-Pacific Exposition and the Panama Canal, of which the exposition will be a celebration. The lecture was one of the most interesting and educational that can be imagined and was well worth an actual trip to the exposition in California.

Back to the dream that Panama had of finding a new route to the Indies by sailing westward and the dream of early voyagers had, the new continent was discovered, by an through the narrow neck of land that separates two oceans at Panama. The greater distance had previously been taken to construct the canal, especially the French. Then he showed colored stereoscopic slides and pictures the every phase of the construction up to the blowing up with 20 tons of dynamite the Gamboa dike, which let the waters of the Atlantic mingle with the waters of the Pacific.

The lecturer showed in colored stereoscopic slides the wonders of landscape and mountain by either of several routes from here to San Francisco and then the wonders wrought by man's nature in California and around the world. It was needless for the speaker to separate the wonders of architecture and other features of the exposition grounds, as moving pictures and slides depicted better than words could do the stupendous work on which the exposition is being engaged. So the 26 foreign nations and states of the union have decided to take part in the celebration. The grounds cover 315 acres and are so arranged that the completed area will be a great city, with the orientation predominating in its make-up and the lighting facilities are so arranged before attempted and are so arranged that there will be no night work from the opening on February 20, 1915 to December 4th of the same year. The hotel association of San Francisco has agreed that rates during the exposition will remain the same as now.

### SUIT AGAINST LEHIGH VALLEY ROAD

New York, March 20.—The Lehigh Valley Railroad Company was sued here by Attorney General Reynolds under the Sherman anti-trust law, as being the dominant factor in a combination alleged to control the output of anthracite from the Pennsylvania fields it touches.

Among the defendants named were: Lehigh Valley Coal Company, Lehigh Valley Coal Sales Company, Cox & Stotesbury, Daniel G. Reid, Charles Steele, Geo. F. Baker and Geo. F. Bacon.

By virtue of its monopoly, the complaint declares, the Lehigh has "prevented the building of any new railroad into the anthracite region served by it, and has kept the independent producers under the disadvantage of having to ship over a railroad also engaged in the coal business."

Furthermore, the bill declares, through its alleged monopoly of the sale of coal produced along its line, the road "completely dominates the market at all points thereon not reached by any other railroad, and has the power to fix, has fixed and does fix without the check of competition, the prices at which anthracite is sold at such points."

The bill points out that the Lehigh annually transports about 11,000,000 gross tons of anthracite. Of that total, the government maintains, more than 82 per cent (in 1913) was shipped for the account of the Lehigh Coal Company or affiliated companies.

### MUSIC AS A CURE FOR INSANITY

Kankakee, Ills., March 20.—Music as a cure for insanity is to have a more extended test in the eastern Illinois state hospital for the insane than has ever before been attempted in Illinois institutions. The plan is an advance on previous music cures in which the patients were merely listeners. It is intended that the patients shall be the musicians.

Instruction and coaching in music will be given and patients who are capable will be encouraged to undertake the teaching of less advanced students.

### PRESIDENT OF CUBA TO ATTEND EXPOSITION.

San Francisco, March 20.—President Menocal of Cuba will attend the Panama-Pacific Exposition here next year, according to an announcement made today by the Cuban commissioner. It was said the president would make the journey from Havana in a Cuban warship.

### URGE TYPHOID VACCINATION.

New Haven, Conn., March 20.—Academic freshmen at Yale, it was stated today, will soon receive from Dean Jones a communication asking each to consult his family physician as to the advisability of inoculation against typhoid fever. Parents of boys planning to go to Yale are also to be asked to consider typhoid inoculation for their sons.

### NAMES LAKE AFTER PRESIDENT'S WIFE.

Washington, March 20.—Lake Elen Wilson now is the name of a beautiful body of water in Glacier National Park. Secretary Lane has so named it in honor of the president's wife. Secretary Lane found the lake, said to be the most beautiful of its size in the west, on his trip last summer. It is a mile long and half a mile wide.

### SHIPPING OUT THE UNEMPLOYED.

Albany, N. Y., March 20.—Another consignment of unemployed men will be shipped up state from New York in about two weeks.

Commissioner Husson of the department of agriculture said today that of the 75 shipped from New York this week only five failed to find work. They were not experienced farm hands and were returned to New York.

### 96,000 Men Out of Work in New York

New York, March 20.—Ninety-six thousand men are out of work in New York city, according to reports from Mayor Mitchell by the population of every precinct in the city. A large share of these are unseasoned workers and the transient trades. The figures are held to contradict some of the reports that have placed the number of unemployed here as high as
