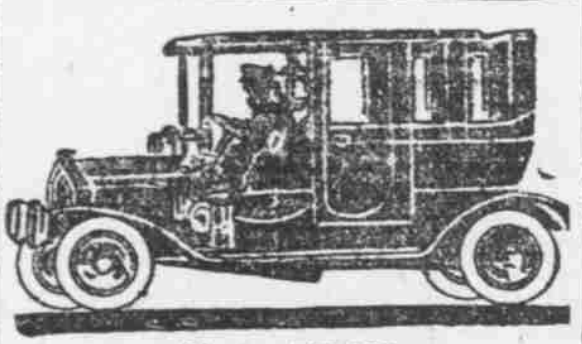

Rev. E. G. Carson Elected Moderator Of Next A. R. P. Presbytery

The First Presbytery of the A. R. P. Synod, which convened at the Huntersville A. R. P. church on Tuesday afternoon, adjourned yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock. The retiring moderator's sermon was preached at the opening session on Tuesday by Rev. J. B. Hood, of Newell, after which Rev. E. B. Hunter, of Sharon, N. C., was introduced as the presiding officer for the present meeting. Mr. Hunter made a splendid presiding officer, putting through the business coming before the body with dispatch.

At the opening session a place for the fall meeting was selected and the moderator elected. Neely's Creek church, near Rock Hill, S. C., was selected and Rev. E. G. Carson, pastor of the Villa Heights congregation, in this city, was elected as moderator. At a later session an urgent invitation came from the Presbyterian church at Matthews to hold the fall meeting there, as the Mecklenburg Presbytery of the Southern Presbyterian Church had been invited and had accepted the invitation. A resolution, thanking these good people for their kind invitation was passed, but as the place of meeting had been selected the day before no effort was made to reconsider the former action. Rev. R. A. Lummus, of Edgemoor, S. C., resigned as presbyterial superintendent of Sabbath schools and young people's work and Rev. W. H. Stevenson, of Leslie, was elected to this position. Rev. A. T. Lindsay, president of Linwood College, resigned as pastor of Pisgah congregation near Gastonia, and the pastoral relation was ordered dissolved by the Presbytery. This is one of the best churches in the Presbytery.

EDUCATION BECOMING MORE ELASTIC. (Columbia Record.) A striking illustration of the changing conditions in educational ideas may be found in the growing appreciation on the part of leading universities of their responsibility to the public. felicitously observes the Journal of the American Medical Association. In former generations a university was regarded as a thing apart, and a college professor was looked on, not only by the numerous paragrappers of the newspapers, but also by a world of ideas, without any connection with practical affairs. Today our leading universities are recognizing not only the opportunity, but also the duty of making available their knowledge for the benefit of the masses. This tendency is highly commendable, especially in the field of public health and prevention of disease. The Harvard Medical School has a standing committee an public lectures which arranges each year for a course of Sunday afternoon talks by members of the faculty. These talks are open to the general public, and are on topics of general interest. In Minnesota the daily press is co-operating in the same kind of work. A series of articles on disease and its prevention by Dr. E. P. Lyon, dean of the University of Minnesota Medical School, recently appeared in the Minneapolis Journal. The University of Missouri is one of the new state universities that have recognized the growing tendency by the organization of a distinct department on public health. A series of bulletins for public reading and distribution are being issued. The five so far completed are on "Bacteria and Disease," "The Prevention of Typhoid Fever," "The Prevention of Contagious Diseases in School Children," "Resuscitation" and "The Relation of Sight and Hearing to Early School Life." Each of these universities has apparently worked out its plans in accordance with the needs

of its own particular field, in Boston, popular Sunday afternoon lectures, in Minnesota, newspaper articles, and in Missouri, pamphlets on specific subjects seem to meet existing conditions.
