### **Election Probe** Resolution Passed

University Party, introduced "a resolution leading to a full investigation of the Student Government Elections Committee" at the Student Lefislature meeting on October 31.

According to Larry, "Everyone at the Legislature meeting seemed to agree that something had to be done. I think most everyone seems to like the bill."

Now that the resolution has been introduced and passed, it is up to the Student Government Executive Committee to make a full investigation of the Conduct and organization of the Elections Committee and submit a full report to the Student Legislature no later than Monday, November 28, 1966.

#### SP Organizes, Looks Forward

The first meeting of the Student Party for the 1966-67 term was held November 2, in room 209 of the University Union.

Since the chairman and vice chairman elected last spring were unable to fill their new offices, the chief item on the agenda was a re-election, Bill Shuford was chosen chairman by acclamation Carlene Crumpley defeated Kay Troutman in the election of vice chairman. Linda Johnson, elected last year, is the Secretary-Trea-Surer.

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Larry explained, "I introduced Larry McAfee, Chairman of the the bill, because I thought that the elections were run rather poorly and that the only way to correct the situation was to make a full investigation of the Elections Comittee." He added, "I was urged to do so by several Freshmen candidates and other people who worked with the campaign."

Seven complaints are listed in the resolution.

(1) Until Thursday, there was no Freshman roster provided in order to keep an accurate list of those Freshmen having voted.

(2) The ballot box was constructed in such a manner as to allow unauthorized entry.

(3) The polls were not open at 8:30 a. m. on Thursday, October

(4) The ballot did not list the candidates alphabetically as specified in the Student Government Election Committee Rules.

(5) No ballots were available for a period of approximately thirty iday, Octob

(6) The polls were closed at 1:00 p.m. on Friday, in spite of the fact that the President of the Student Body had specifically stated on Wednesday, October 26 in the Freshman Assembly that the polls would remain open until 4:00 p.m. on said Friday.

(7) Each candidate was not given sufficient opportunity to provide for an observer to be present during the counting of the ballots.
