Perhaps your bag might be helping some underprivileged children catch up in school or to assist the advanced children to achieve beyond the realm of their classroom study. The Charlotte-Mecklenburg school system has The Charlotte-Mecklenburg school system has a definite need for your help. SNEA at UNC—Charlotte has organized a project in which you and all other interested students can have the chance to work with culturally and economically deprived children.

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All around school on the bulletin boards are "Fill Your Bag" posters. That's what you can do by working in this project. A minimum of two hours a week on your part can mean a great deal this year to a child who cannot read, spell, or do any one of a number of other seemingly easy things. Anyone who is interested in teaching and anyone who would interested in teaching and anyone who would sincerely like to help these children should consider this project. You would work closely with a child or a small group of children assisting them to master things giving them trouble. These children need this individual attention which, in the average schoolroom situation, their own teacher cannot spare
