A commuter replies

Dear Editor:

The definition of the University Community involves more than a problem of semantics. Crucial questions of power and influence are involved in this definition. Some students believe that the "dorm student is the University" (Holder, JOURNAL 12-17-70). These students believe that "power is concentrated where it should be, among the elite few" (Holder, JOURNAL- 12-17-70). I think that this definition of a University community and power structure leaves 3/4 of the UNCC student body out in the cold.

Students at UNCC do not seem to be entitled to elite status because they happen to live in the dorms. ALL students, are part of the University community. Each ought to have the right to try to influence University policy if he

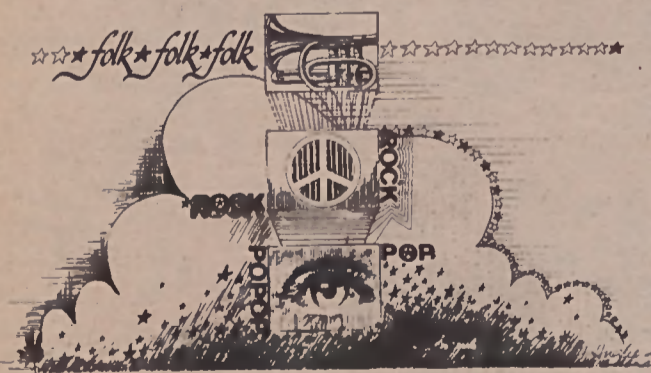
so decides. Each ought to have the right to be active in participation in University activities. This should be a matter of individual choice. Some students are naturally going to become more involved than others. Personal choice is not necessarily determined by geography. There are students who are vitally involved in the University who are not dorm students. To say that commuters are content to be inactive and unrepresented (Holder, JOURNAL, 12-17-70) is a glaring falsity. The evidence will not support such a statement. Students leading movements in political action with regard to electoral politics, Viet-Nam, Cambodia did not happen to reside in the dorms. Many of the leaders in the Black Student Movement are commuting students. Students active in the literary publications at UNCC are not residents at UNCC. Much is made of the fact that dorm students were able to "expose" SAGA by means of this Fall's series in the JOURNAL. The

Food Service Committee was set up back in 1969. This came about as a result of student complaint with Food Service at UNCC BEFORE the "Expose" of the JOURNAL.

It is clear that the University Community involves more than our friends in the dorms. Yet when one looks at the composition of the Student Legislature, the JOURNAL and most other agents of students power one finds an overwhelming preponderance of dorm students. It is certainly not representative of students at UNCC. I hope that these dorm students in positions of influence do not share Mr. Holder's opinion of the commuting student. Just in case they do it would be helpful if the commuting students can attain some of these positions of influence.
