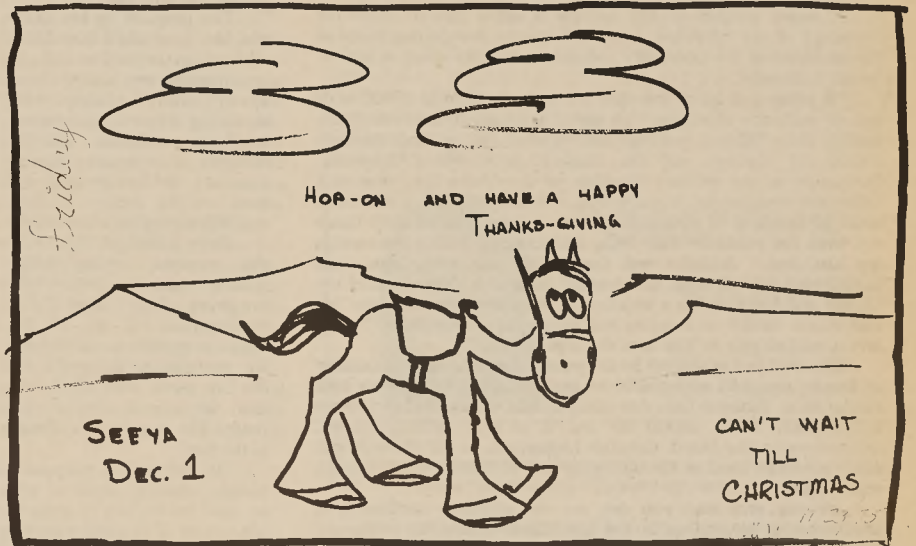

As previously stated in this letter, I am not asking for help, and since I'm considerably over 30 years old, I would never suggest that the students stage a park in to force the Board of Trustees to consider that there might be inequities in parking regulations at the university.
