GIVE US BETTER ROADS.

The people of Cabarrus are and have ever been ashamed of the condition of the public roads of our county. There is perhaps nothing that so reflects discredit upon our excellent county as the miserable such persons convicted in his court to such county. roads in the winter. It also provides for a certain amount of manual labor from each citizen. And last, but not least, it provides a way by which our convicts and inmates of the jail can be utilized in working the roads.
