To Reduce Cotton Acreage. The following resolutions were adopted by the Scotland Neck Alliance: Whereas, the enormous cotton crop of 1890 has reduced the price of cotton from 11 to 7 cents per pound;

And whereas, in our opinion, our only relief is in the reduction of acreage to be planted in 1892; Therefore, we the Scotland Neck Alliance assembled, do most earnestly recommend that a convention of the planters of the cotton growing States be called to meet in some Southern State hereafter to be named, and that delegates be elected and sent to said convention to discuss and formulate some plan by which this great evil may be averted.

We most cordially ask the co-operation of all farmers that are interested in the cultivation of cotton. We also request all editors and newspaper men that are friendly to the agricultural interest of the South to agitate this subject in their respective papers.

What a difference! North Carolina has no statue erected to any of her public men except the small one at Kinston in honor of Governor Caswell. How different it is in Virginia! Besides her statues, Lee, Jackson, and a host of others have had their heroism perpetuated by some imperishable monument. Yesterday was Gen. Wickham's day—a cavalry officer, like our own Gen. James B. Gordon. And now a proposition is made to embalm the memory of J. E. B. Stuart in enduring bronze. He fell at Yellow Tavern while seeking to arrest the raid of the Federal Cavalry on Richmond, and Gordon was mortally wounded the next evening while holding Sheridan's Cavalry in check almost in sight of Richmond—Grant and Lee being then engaged at Chancellorsville—May 19, 1862. When will Northern Catholics manifest a proper pride in such matters?—News and Observer.

A Prosperous Farmer. Mr. John H. Webb, of Stem, Granville county, was among the visitors to the Exposition yesterday. He has been farming all his life—was never in debt, makes everything he eats at home, never bought a pound of hay, barrel of flour or bushel of corn in his life. He believed in the maxim "Pay as you go." He has not yet sold his last year's crop of tobacco. A singular thing in connection with this thrifty farmer is that he is now living in the house his grandfather built in 1778. He uses the same dining table that his grandfather used, and his son and grandson are with him. This makes five generations who have lived in the same house. Mr. Webb and some of his neighbors buy their own chemicals and make their own fertilizers at a cost of \$21.10 per ton, and he says it is better and cheaper than that bought by his neighbors who belong to the Alliance.—State Chronicle.

Horrible Death. Tuesday morning Dolph Robinson a colored brakeman on the Western road, while standing on a box car was knocked off as the train ran by the coal chute at Crossing. He fell between the cars, and his legs getting tangled in the brake he was dragged to Catawba, a distance of five miles, before he was discovered. One side of his head and face were worn off by bumping against the ground and crotches. His body was brought to the Newton depot where an inquest was held. He was a native of this county, and had only recently served out a term in the penitentiary.—Newton Enterprise.

The committee on hospitality of the Missionary Baptist church expect 500 delegates to attend the State convention which meets at Goldsboro November 11th.

Colonel Lowry, one of the best known metallurgists in the country, has completed arrangements for the establishment of a nickel-steel plant at a point in the French Broad valley. The plant will be the only one in the United States to manufacture of this metal, and the product is expected to command the remarkably high price of from \$250 to \$300 per ton. Col. Lowry, the Asheville Home Journal states, owns his own nickel and iron ore beds, and will personally superintend the whole enterprise. He will make his permanent residence at Asheville.
