REV. YONAN'S LECTURE.
He contrasts Christian and Heathen Conditions and Pleads for Help to Enslaved Lands.

An announced, Rev. Yonan, the native Persian, held at the First Presbyterian church Wednesday night. Many have heard him before, and they gladly hear him at any time.

He is a most earnest advocate of the Christian religion. He contrasts the faith with those of Mohammedanism in his native land.

He showed that Islam is by very distinct a religious belief. It has a sense of a superior being, a god and a hereafter. The false religion leads to the greatest sacrifices and bodily tortures to expiate a sense of guilt and appease the wrath of the god he only seems to know exists.

Heathendom, said the lecturer, is an enemy to the mind or intellect and the body as well as the soul. He dwelt forcibly on the need of the care for the body as a preliminary to that of the soul. The body is the temple of the Holy Ghost, and was created for the honor and glory of God, but heathendom made it a prison for its development and culture. Doctors, said he, are greatly needed.

He deplored the ill state of health and in cities. There is no cleanliness where there is no godliness. Sanitation is unknown and the filthy streets in the cities is more than filled with rot and pestilence. He spoke of the epidemic nature of the disease and the care for the victims are tenderly cared for and the disease is subdued with sanitation, to make his native country, where the victim is unclean for and the disease is uncleaned, it is his curse.

There are more blind people in Persia, Arabia, than anywhere else. There is no recognition of the care of children's eyes and the attempts at treating the eyes, like the few attempts to cure the sick, only result in the more or less destruction.

Woman, said the speaker, is kept in the most abject ignorance and dishonor. The customs forbid a Christian physician from seeing a man's wife even to give her treatment, and she is unvisited and unvisited by her husband or neighbors. Rather she is brutally reproached and charged with not being sick.

Persia and Turkey, said the speaker, are the only two absolute monarchies. People here, said he, know nothing about what a monarchy is. They are the nurseries of ignorance. There are no schools except for the priests. Indeed, ignorance is the only soil in which an absolute monarchy can grow. An absolute monarchy is an impossibility where Christian intelligence exists. Here the speaker pointed to a few examples of what such government produces. He had himself seen human beings eating grass as breeding beasts for want of something better on which to satisfy hunger. Officers live in luxury and licentiousness and tax the people out of everything. If a man wears a new coat that he is looked upon as thriving, and he is made the victim of official examination. A man received a demand for tax. He went to the governor and plead that if he could everything he would still leave much of the bill unpaid. Said the potentate, then sell your children too, so that the tax is paid. Being more courageous than most men he pressed his way to the monarch and finally got an order to be treated with mercy. This order he presented to the governor, whereupon this governor advanced his courage very much, and promising that he had a very large heart ordered his executioner to show him that man's heart. The executioner cut it out of course and carried it to the governor, who kept it for a day to look upon.

Such is monarchial government. The world needs doctors, said he, to care for and develop the body, schools to develop the mind, politics to produce good government, and above all, it needs Christ to save the soul. The speaker appealed to the people of our Christian land in behalf of benighted, depraved perishing humanity.

The speaker is really interesting. His speech demonstrates that it takes more than a knowledge of a language to decipher idiom or understand its articulation, but by translating the ear a little while his words were accurately enough caught and his

thought is fully comprehended. The simplicity of his faith is inspiring and his zeal gives promise of great good in the cause. One feels the anxiety to have many natives to send who enjoy peculiar advantages for the work among the heathen.

MR. H. H. THOMAS DEAD.
