PRESIDENT WILL NOT INTERFERE. The Shipment of Horses from Port of Chalmette Does Not Show Violations of Neutrality Laws. Washington, April 22.—The report of Colonel Crowder, who investigated the shipment of horses and mules to South Africa from the port of Chalmette, La., was laid before the cabinet to-day, by the President. While the report is incomplete, it developed that the conclusion was reached by the President from what he has seen of it; that there is not sufficient evidence to show past or present violation of neutrality laws, and consequently there is no warrant for intervention. Colonel Crowder made some additions to his report during the afternoon and to night he went over the matter very thorough by with the President and the Attorney General.
