A Petition of Over 400 Voters of No. 12 Went Before the County Commissioners—An Election Will be Held Tuesday the 19th of April.

Concord township sent up a petition of over 400 voters asking the County Commissioners the privilege of voting to issue \$75,000 worth of bonds to the building of the Concord Southern railroad.

The election was ordered to be held on the 19th of April.
