Mr. Lutz at His New Home.

Rev. W. A. Lutz, who is well known in this county and having recently removed from Enochville, Rowan county, has made a favorable impression in Winston. The Daily Sentinel thus speaks of his services on Sunday:

The text from which the pastor preached yesterday is especially fruitful. He chose Matt. 15:22-28, with parallel text, Mark, 7:24-30. In describing the Syro-Phœnician woman as she besought Christ to help her daughter possessed of a devil, he drew a contrast between good and bad women. The best characters described in Holy writ he said next to Christ were women, but the worst characters next to Satan, were also women. Here we have a gentlewoman from an idolatrous and ungodly country, who had no claim on Christ, bringing her case before Him, and when treated indifferently by Christ and repulsed by the Disciples, yet pressed her case and conquered the Savior. The devil could not do this. How many mothers are there in Winston-Salem, who, like this woman, go to Christ in behalf of their sons and daughters? he asked. He showed that Christian mothers have a claim on Christ, and thus they are doubly sure of their prayers being answered if they have the faith of this woman, of Tyre and Sidon. During the service many tears were seen on the earnest faces in the congregation. He announced that he would preach on the office and importance of baptism next Sunday at 7:30 p. m.
