## COUNTY NOMINATING CONVENTION

**Full Ticket Put Out—Some are Present Officers—Some have been Independents, but all have been Democrats.**

The convention was called to order by Mr. Watt Barringer. Mr. H. B. Parks, of No. 1, was made temporary chairman; Mr. W. W. Robinson, of No. 2, was made secretary and Mr. W. H. Hegler, of No. 1, was made assistant secretary.

The roll of to-vnships was called, all responded except Nos. 7 and 8. It was moved that any person in the house in sympathy with the Third party from Nos. 7 and 8 that they act as delegates. None appeared.

The temporary organization was made permanent.

The following resolution was offered by Capt. C. McDonald: Resolved, that each man be allowed to support the Democratic State ticket without question of his loyalty to the Third Party. Vote: 44 in favor and 8 against.

J. M. W. Alexander was unanimously elected chairman of the county executive committee, and Watt Barringer and J. V. Pethel were elected members of the county executive committee.

The following nominations made by the committee were voted on:

M. C. Walter, for coroner, 52 votes.

Surveyor H. T. Baker 52 votes; Cotton weigher: F. V. Barrier 22; C. A. Pitts 5; J. M. Coley 5; R. S. Harris 5; W. L. Parish 5; 2nd, ballot: F. V. Barrier 37; W. L. Parish 15. Barrier's nomination made unanimous.

Register of Deeds: Jno. K. Patterson 6; J. H. Moose 42; W. P. Barnhardt 4. Moose's nomination made unanimous.

Treasurer: Jno. A. Sims by acclamation.

Sheriff: E. P. Deal 4; F. P. Boger 24; E. C. Davis 18. Boger's nomination made unanimous.

House of Representatives: J. R. Bradford 5; J. H. Earnhardt 5; S. L. Klutz 6; J. B. White 7; J. M. W. Alexander 13; C. McDonald 15; 2nd ballot: Alexander 25; McDonald 25; White 2. 3rd ballot: Alexander 30; McDonald 25. Alexander's nomination made unanimous.

Senate: A. F. Hileman 39; J. B. White 13. Hileman's nomination was made unanimous. Mr. Hileman was called for a speech and said "that a hungry man was not able to make much of a speech, but they would hear from him later."

The convention was harmonious in every respect.

### NOTES.

Mr. M. C. Walter is the present coroner and was elected by the Democrats two years ago.

Mr. F. V. Barrier for cotton weigher is a No. 5 man, but for nearly a year has been a citizen of Concord.

Mr. Jno. Hugh Moose, of No. 7,

has been a candidate several times for the office of Register of Deeds.

Mr. Frank P. Boger, of No. 10, is the nominee for sheriff. He is a son of Mr. Allen Boger, one of the oldest citizens of No. 10.

Mr. Jno. A. Sims is the present treasurer and made an efficient officer. He was elected by the Democrats two years ago. Mr. Sims is the county business agent of the Alliance.

Mr. H. T. Baker, of No. 10, is a native of Kentucky but has been a resident of No. 10, this county. Mr. Baker is a well educated gentleman and a successful teacher.

Capt. J. M. W. Alexander, familiarly known among his friends as "Jack" Alexander, is a citizen of No. 1. Mr. Alexander used to be a very hot and uncompromising Democrat and he's just that kind of a Third party man now. Capt. Alexander was once the nominee of the Democratic party to represent the 28th Senatorial district, but was defeated by an independent candidate.

Mr. A. F. Hileman is a substantial citizen of No. 5. He ran independent once and was elected; he was nominated once by the Democrats (2 years ago) and elected to the Legislature.

No. 10 gets a good showing, having two candidates.

The names of Jno. K. Patterson and R. S. Harris were presented, but they are Democrats.

### North Carolina Republicans.

Charlotte, N. C., Sept. 2.—At a conference between Chairman Eaves and the republican managers in Washington and New York it was decided to nominate Judge W. P. Bynum for governor of North Carolina. In an interview today with a Charlotte News reporter, Bynum said: "I am not a candidate for that office, and will not accept that or any other nomination under any circumstances."

The nomination will go to James E. Boyd.
