Such is the description given of Mr. S. Otho Wilson, by a gentleman who recently saw him in New York, Mr. Wilson was attired for a visit to the Republican National Headquarters in that city. It is reported that Chairman Carter and Mr. Wilson talked quite freely about money for political purpose in North Carolina, and that possibly Chairman Carter was impressed that Mr. Wilson could use some republican interest in this State. The Goldsboro Argus published that on Monday night, August 29, Mr. Wilson and Dr. Exum and John S. Smith and H. L. Grant, and other leaders of the Third party and of the Republican party held a caucus in Goldsboro. On Wednesday, after that caucus, Mr. Wilson was seen by a friend of ours in New York City, where he visited the Republican Headquarters. These circumstances are at least suspicious.

They show that the leaders of the Third party and of the Republican party are not at all afraid of each other, and that Mr. Wilson is so brotherly in his feelings, and so confident of pecuniary assistance, that he goes as far as New York to confer with the Republican chairman. What does all this mean? Are our people blind that they cannot see what is going on? Is it not clear that these leaders are conspiring to defeat the democratic party? Can there be any doubt about it? Will those who have joined the Third party, from honest motives and purpose, allow themselves to be used in the interest of the Republican party to elect Harrison and a Republican Congress, and to restore the rule of corrupt men in this State? When they see that they have been deceived; that those who aspire to lead them are conspiring with Republicans—the deadly enemy of reform, will they longer remain as the foundation for the perpetration of political deception and fraud?

By the way, Mr. Wilson, suppose you attire yourself to-morrow in that silk hat and new suit you had on, when you visited the Republican National Headquarters, so that your Republican friends in North Carolina may see how you looked when in New York. They will be here tomorrow at their State Convention.

John C. Smith for Governor.

All of these committeemen are urged to be present at that time.
