his Statistical Report is Given That You May Compare With The Work Done in 1892—An Increase in The Vote of The County is Probable—Concord has Over 800 Now.

The election in 1888 was very quiet. The total vote was not even an average vote, it amounted to only 2644 for the three candidates, Fowle, Dockery and Walker.

Concord polled 486 votes in 1888, and she can poll 813 this year if all turn out. The registration is as follows:

Tom Watson Done for—The South Solid And North Carolina O. K.

North Carolina is Democratic. The South remains solid.

Tom Watson, of Georgia, is defeated by 3,000.

New York gives Cleveland 40,000 majority.

The Democrats claim Connecticut, New Jersey, Indiana and Illinois. Weaver carries several Western states and thus hurts Harrison.

At 1:36 a. m. Mr. Jas. Shevlin, of Brooklyn, telegraphed Mr. W G Means as follows: "Cleveland's majority in New York State 40,000; Indiana, 12,000; Illinois, 10,000; Alabama 10,000; and Connecticut 1,800." If all this be true Grover is almost unanimously elected.

In this issue, time and space will not admit giving the votes, by townships, of each candidate. We give however the aggregate vote. Here is the vote:

For Register of Deeds, Jno. K Patterson, 1715; Jno. H Moose, 1089, Patterson's majority. 626. Surveyor Long, 1711; H T Baker, 968, Long's majority, 743 Esq. Jas. N Brown, for coroner, 1799; M C Walter, 994; Brown's majority, 805.

For Congress, Henderson 1188; Holton, republican, 569; Shuford, (T P) 968. Presidential electors: Cleveland, 1422; Harrison, 661; Weaver 830. Mr. Bidwell received about 40 votes in the county. The republicans lost about 425 votes by the Third party, which drew only about 400 from the Democrats.

The election in the county is no surprise to any man who was informed on the situation, except in the vote for Treasurer. Many thought Mr. Jno. A Sims would defeat Mr. Cline. While the result is different, Mr. Sims ran ahead of his ticket. The Standard will say this for Mr. Sims: A faithful and efficient officer has gone down in defeat by standing to what he believed right. The Standard believes that Mr. Sims was honest and sincere in his position; and while Mr. Sims made a good fight, democracy ruled otherwise.

Cabarrus has enjoyed a Democratic victory that surpasses that of 1888, regardless of the Third Party.

THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION.

The President Appoints the 24th of November as the Day on Which Recognition Shall Be Made of The Blessings of Providence.

Washington, Nov. 4.—By the President of the United States of America:

A proclamation. The gifts of God to our people during the past year have been so abundant and so special that the spirit of devout thanksgiving awaits not a call, but only the appointment of a day when it may a common expression. He has stayed the pestilence at our door; He has given us more love for the three civil institutions in the creation of which His directing providence was so conspicuous; He has awakened a deeper reverence for law; He has widened our philanthropy by a call to succor the distress in other lands; He has blessed our schools and is bringing forward a patriotic and God-fearing generation to execute his great and benevolent designs for our country; He has given us great increase in material wealth and a wide diffusion of contentment and comfort in the homes of our people; He has given his grace to the sorrowing;

Wherefore, I, Benjamin Harrison, President of the United States, do call upon all our people to observe, as we have been wont, Thursday, the 24th day of this month of November, as a day of Thanksgiving to God for his mercies, of supplication for his continued care and grace.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the City of Washington this fourth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, and of the independence of the United States the one hundred and seventeenth.
