New town ordinances. sioners for the town of Concord, N. C.

Section A-That the bicycle ordiance passed by this Board at it meeting on August 14th, 1894, is hereby repealed.
Section B-That no one riding a icycle within the corporate limits of the Town of Oonpord shall, when within 15 feet of a woman or a child ravel meeting or passing the same ravel at a greater speed than an
ordinary walk; and no one shall ride bicycle within said corporate imits at night without displaving a headlight, and when meeting or passing any one ringing a bell. Asy person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be uilty of a misdemeanor; and uron onriction thereof, shall be fined Ten Dollars or imprisoned for ten Thys.
This ordinance is in effect on and fter this dato. September, 11, '94 2. That any one who shall pro are, directly or indirect' $y$, for any erson or persons, any intoxicating quors, within the corporate limits of the town of Concord, State of orth Carolina, or aet as agent of any intoxicating liquor within the corporate limits of said win the Concord, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined ifty dollars, or ims prisoned for thirty days.
Provided, hnwever, that the provisions of this ordinance shall ot apply to licensed druggists or 3. That physicians, or railroads. 3. That any one who shall de liver to any person or persons, any
intoxicating liquor within the cor porate limits of the within the cor porate limits of the town of Conn of a practicing physician, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined fifty dollars or imprisoned for thirty days. Provided however, that this ordinance shall not apply to expreas companies, licensed druggists or practicing physicians.
The foremoing ordinances shall be $n$ effect on and after September 1st 1894. By order of the Board.
