NEW TOWN ORDINANCES.

Be it ordained by the Commissioners for the town of Concord, N. C.

Section A—That the bicycle ordinance passed by this Board at its meeting on August 14th, 1894, is hereby repealed.

Section B—That no one riding a bicycle within the corporate limits of the Town of Concord shall, when within 15 feet of a woman or a child and meeting or passing the same travel at a greater speed than an ordinary walk; and no one shall ride a bicycle within said corporate limits at night without displaying a headlight, and when meeting or passing any one ringing a bell.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor; and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined Ten Dollars or imprisoned for ten days.

This ordinance is in effect on and after this date. September, 11, '94.

2. That any one who shall procure, directly or indirectly, for any person or persons, any intoxicating liquors, within the corporate limits of the town of Concord, State of North Carolina, or act as agent of any person or persons in procuring any intoxicating liquor within the corporate limits of said town of Concord, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor; and upon conviction shall be fined fifty dollars, or imprisoned for thirty days.

Provided, however, that the provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to licensed druggists or practicing physicians, or railroads.

3. That any one who shall deliver to any person or persons, any intoxicating liquor within the corporate limits of the town of Concord, unless upon the prescription of a practicing physician, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined fifty dollars or imprisoned for thirty days.

Provided however, that this ordinance shall not apply to express companies, licensed druggists or practicing physicians.

The foregoing ordinances shall be in effect on and after September 1st 1894. By order of the Board.
