Baltimore, April 11,-President Hoffman, of the Saboard Air Line, said today that the decision of the inter-State commerce commission, which permits the Southeru Kailroad company to meet the cut in passenger rates mads ky the Seaboard to Atlanta without reduciug the rate intermediate points, would not ffect the situation materially, except that the decision might give the im-
