The Green Goods Thief Arrested.

Richmond, Va., Jan. 5.—Thomas H. Parker, the man arrested in Petersburg as one of the men who yesterday swindled Mr. A. W. Wishers, of Gloucester county, out of \$5,000 by passing off blocks of copper for gold bricks, was brought here at noon. Parker is thought to be the alleged ringer of the Philadelphia mint who acted as the confederate of John Williams. When the deal was made Parker wore a long steel gray beard, but when taken up in Petersburg his beard had been removed. A telegram from Lynchburg, Va., says Williams and another man later got in the swindle had been arrested in that city.
