A NOVEL IDEA.

heimer's Springs-Lawyer Crowell Makes a Suggestion.

Ex-Mayor J L Crowell has returned from Patterson's Springs. He is much improved, STANDARD is pleased to say.

But while talking, Lawyer Crowell made a novel suggestion. It is this:

Concord can be made a fine summer and winter resort, if a stock company would purchase the Misenheimer & Lentz Springs and run the excellent sulphur water to Concord, into a hotel large enough to accommodate a large patronage.

When told that the distance is 17 miles, Mr. Crowell said that is alright. The direct distance is not over 14 miles and half-inch pipe can be buried. These pipes can be purchased for 1 cent a foot and there is an outlay of only \$739 20.

The Springs property will have to be purchased, and the only trouble might be in getting the

The pipe might be tapped at Mt Pleasant for the benefit of the schools, making the expense accordingly less.

Mr. Crowell thinks the scheme practical and, selling the water at a cent a glass, it would be a profitable enterprise.

Sulphur water running 14 miles in iron pipes would make a fine medicinal combination.

A Sunday Runaway.

An Ordinance to Prohibit Sunday Trading-The Board Will be Consulted To-Night-Cigars, Tobacco, Melons, Ice and Other Perishable Goods Cannot Lawfully be Sold on Sunday.

SUNDAY A FEAST DAY.

A prohibitory law has been un earthed to stop Sunday trading by the merchants of the town. This law was passed in 1886 and has never been enforced.

At the meeting of the board o commissioners to night parties wil consult the authorities and ask tha the following ordinance be strictly enforced, which will stop the sale of cigars, tobacco, melons, e'c., on Sunday :'

"Ordinance No. 25. That any person or persons who shall sell on the Sabbath day, within the corporate limits of said town, except medicine, or in case of necessity, any article of trade or merchandise, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be for each and every offence fined five dollars or imprisoned for five days."

Merchants in all parts of the city have violated this ordinance. Sunday has not been properly observed, it is claimed, and has been made a feast day since the melon season is on. If enforced, the drng stores will not have the cinch on the Sunday cigar and tobacco trade, as heretofore.

And the chief of police says "if the board wants the law enforced, I will see that it is done." The commissioners will re-consider the bicy cle ordinance again to-night. The meeting will be one of interest, and the result one that everyone is watching. !

Mr. Burrage returned Saturday night from a visit to his brother, Mr. J H Burrage, at Asheville. He was greatly impressed with the push and business like ar pearance of Asheville and suburbs. He reports good crops, money plentiful, business lively, and everything moving on to prosperity. It is said by parties who came in from Charlotte last night and this morning that the train, due here at 8:01 Sunday morning, while running at a rate of 70 miles per hour in a short curve, jumped the track and the whole train of six coaches, with the exception of the engine and one Mount Amoena sleeping car rolled down a 60 foot embankment. 
