The Franklin County Assasination,

Mr. J T Harris, of Franklin county, is in the city. He tells us that his son who was shot a week ago last Thursday night, is improving and the doctors think he will recover. The details of the attempt. ed assination, some accounts of which have already been published in this paper, as given by Mr. Harris show it to have been a crime of a kind happily rare in North Carolina,

My sons never intended to have anything to do with him again. O'Bryant had been heard to say that he was going to kill James Harris, but this evidence sould not be used, and O'Bryant was discharged for want of evidence."
