## PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE.

A High Grade Institution for the Women at Modern Costs—A Wrong Idea.

Early in 1895 the two Presbyteries of Concord and Mecklenburg of the Synod of North Carolina entered into negotiations relative to the establishment of a Denominational College within their bounds. As a result of this movement, the generous offer of Charlotte, and the kind offer of Miss Lily W Long, Principal of the Charlotte Seminary for Girls, toward consolidation, the Presbyterian College was located in the so-called Queen City of the South. Under the care of a Board of Trustees composed of fourteen men from the two Presbyteries, who have purchased large and extensive grounds and buildings in Charlotte, the College is on a firm basis. Already has the Seminary for Girls gained a wide reputation, and with the co-operation of this Presbyterian community and the strong support which Charlotte promises, the College, which is the Seminary under a new regime, a larger Faculty and far superior facilities, bids fair to be a most successful and useful institution. For the first year its management has been entrusted to Miss Long and Mr. Tinsley P Junkin, formerly of Columbia, S. C.

The design of the College is to furnish young women a thorough and practical education on such reasonable terms as to bring it within the reach of all, however limited their means. The rates charged are only intended to cover the actual cost. Let it be distinctly understood, however, that though cheapness in cost is one peculiarity, cheapness does not exist in the quality of work done or the accommodations furnished.

It seems that a wrong idea as to the costs of this institution has gone abroad. Board alone, including light and heat, is only \$10.00 a month, or \$100 for the year. Board and tuition \$150, which is from \$50 to \$100 less than any high grade college in the South.

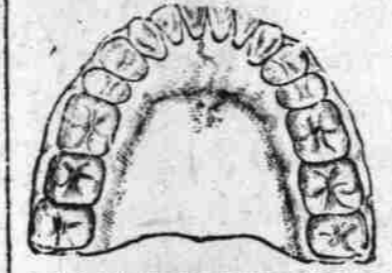
