OUR MODERN TORPEDO BOAT.

There is at Baltimore a torpedo boat almost finished that is to be launched and tested in a few weeks. If this boat comes up to the measure of its expectation the strength of great navies will be a departed glory.

This boat can float on the top of the water and almost as quickly as a fish can sink beneath the waves and be almost invisible while it goes on in its course to carry destruction to the largest battle ship.

The invention of the Monitor by Ericson revolutionized modern naval power, and he even lied to see that another revolution was advancing. It is not very encouraging now to spend many millions on a battle

ship that can be so readily sent to the bottom of the ocean by a little submarine torpedo boat that costs only a few hundred thousands.

We have a half a million dollars out now, and we want to know what we are to realize on that before we put more money at the
