#### THE CHANGE.

We have always felt proud of Governor Carr, at least since his message to the last general assembly. His respectful but earnest appeals to that body not to change the existing mode of county government for one promising less safety in parts of the State were timely and good.

He refers to the efforts made before and their failure to meet the approbation of the voters in the State and plead the demonstrated merits of the then existing system. In the campaigns referred to our brightest star, Vance, threw the light of his grand intellect on and saved the State from the blunder. He argued that our old system was equally good for us and far better for the Eastern section. He said we could afford even to make some sacrifices for the wishes and the benefit of the East. The people heard him and heeded. Gov. Carr was less successful and the last General Assembly made the change and we are about to launch forth on doubtful seas that

we have not tried since the days of reconstruction. We doubt very much whether this matter is receiving due consideration.

We hope our people will bear these things in mind and will defeat the movement that promises no good but much harm.

A German inventor has built a house of hollow tubes, whose advantages are, he says, a constant temperature and incidentally strength, comfort and beauty. He first put up a frame of water tubing, allowing continuous circulation to a stream of water. Around this frame he put up his house in the ordinary way. The peculiarity is that all floors and ceilings are crossed and recrossed by the water pipes. The water, having passed through horizontal tubes under the floors and ceilings, passes through the vertical tubes until all have been gone through. In the summer, fresh, cool water circulates under pressure through the net work of tubes, cools the walls, and, after having run its course, flows off considerably warmer than when it entered. In its course it has absorbed much heat which it carries away. During the long and severe winter the water entering through the basement is first heated to nearly 100 degrees and then forced through the ceiling. Of course much of the heat is left all over the house, and at the outlet the temperature of the water is about 40 degrees. The speed of the circulation of water can be regulated so as to allow fixing a certain temperature, equal throughout the building.—Press-Visitor.
