A German inventor bas built a house ot hollow tubes, whose advan takes are, he says, a constant temperature and incidentally strengtb, confort snd beauty. He first put up a frame of water tubing, allowing continuous circulation to a stream of water. Around this frame he put up his bouse in the ordicary way. The peculiarity 16 that all floors and ceilings are that all floo1s and ceilings are
crossed and recrosed by the water pipes. The water, having passed through horizontal tubs under the floors and ceilings, passes through the vertical tabes until all have been gone through. In the summer, fresh, cool water circulates under pressare through the net woik of tubes, cools the walls, and, after having run its course, flows off considerably warmer than when it en tered. In its course it has absorbed much heat which it carries away. During the long and sefere , winter the water fntering through the basement is first heated to nearly 100 degrees and then forced through the ceiling. Of course much of the heat is left all over the house, and at the outlet the temperature of the water is about 40 degrees. The speed of the circulation of water can be regulated so as to alluw fixing a certain temperature, equal throughout he building.-Press-Visitor.
